



Thomas Cup & Uber Cup History

The Thomas Cup represents international supremacy in men's team badminton, while the Uber Cup represents international supremacy in women's team badminton. This is the third time that the Thomas and Uber Cup competitions have been held together. These contests are held bi-annually, alternating years with the individual World Championships.

Sir George Thomas and Mrs. Betty Uber exemplify the quality and spirit of international play. Their commitment on and off the court has enabled many representatives from various countries to participate in an atmosphere of fine sportsmanship in the game we know as badminton.

THOMAS CUP

The "Bart Cup" was how an enthusiastic American youngster described Sir George's visionary gift to world badminton. But for all that, he was never a man to stand on ceremony or title.

Sir George Thomas, himself, not only had an impressive career in the administration of badminton on local, national and international levels, but also as a player. From 1903 to 1929, a 26 year period, Sir George represented Enlgand on 29 occasions, won 21 All-England Championships and 90 National Championships. This is extraordinary when you consider that the top men players today would be under 26 years of age.

In 1939, just five years after the formation of the International Badminton Federation (IBF), Sir George Thomas felt it was time to have an international men's championship. More, he offered to give a trophy. His purpose was to create for badminton a competition similar to the Davis Cup in tennis. The concept and offer were eagerly accepted. Unfortunately, the outbreak of the Second World War postponed the first official contest until the 1948-49 season.

The Cup, which bears his name, is of hammered silver-gilt. It stands 28" high with a span including the handles of 16". It is made in three pieces: plinth, cup and lid; a figure of a player, static, surmounts the latter. On the back and on the plinth there is space for the winner's names.

The competition's original format was five men's singles and four men's double, played over two evenings and was held triennially. Nations were divided into four zones: Pan American, Asian, Australiasian, and European. Where there were 6 - 12 entrants, the finalists in the previous competition were exempt until the semi-final; if more than 12 entrants, then all four semi-finalists were exempt until the quarter-finals. To the four zone winners were added the host nation and the holders who participated in the inter-zone ties.

In 1982, the IBF changed the nine-match format to five matches: three singles and two doubles; with the competitions being held every two years (even-numbered years) in conjunction with the Uber Cup competition. Zones were abolished but Regional Qualifying playoffs (venues) are held in February in several parts of the world. The winners of these playoffs, along with the defending nations, gather in one location in May or June for the final rounds.

UBER CUP

It took the Ladies' International Badminton Championships for the Uber Cup (the full title) seven years to reach fruition. In 1950 New Zealand presented the idea for the women's competition after the first successful Thomas Cup Championship. In

1953 the plan was agreed on in principle, and in 1956 Mrs. Betty Uber formally presented the trophy and made the draw for the first competition from it. From this point rules and regulations were set up for triennial contests starting with the 1956-57 season. As with the Thomas Cup format changes have occurred. The Uber Cup is now contested every two years concurrently with the Thomas Cup.

Mrs. Uber began playing badminton for England during the 1926-27 season and continued to play until her retirement in 1951. During this 25-year period she represented England 27 times, won the All-England mixed doubles title 8 times, took 53 championsips in western Europe and South Africa, and won 51 consecutive events in international competition. These accomplishments are amazing when you consider there was no badminton played during the war years. Mrs Uber designed the trophy herself and had it crafted in London. It is suitably inscribed, stands 18" high and consists of a swivel-globe surmounted by a shuttle on which is poised an active lady player.

The Spectator's Guide to Badminton

Stroking, fitness, balance, and tactics are the key to badminton. "Stroking" involves the actual production of the shots. It is difficult to produce the shot well if one is not fit enough to get to the shuttle in time. Having got there in time, one must remain on balance before, during and after the stroke. Finally, "tactics" is the ability to mix the other three elements together in a winning combination.

What to watch for?

Stroking - is the stroking smooth or choppy? Compare you own strokes or those of the average player on court. Watch the strokes of the superstars. How effortless they seem! How gracefull! Note the absence of a long backswing or follow through.

Balance - is there a lot of huffing and puffing? Is the player consistently taking the shuttle high at the net? and above him in the backcourt? If the shuttle is taken low at the net or behind the player in the backcourt, he is probably tiring. Watch then for stalling between rallies - the long "S" curve back to the service position.

Tactics - Look at the badminton rally in singles as a game of chess, with one player testing the other's ability in terms of (1) stroking - "how's your backhand or smash returns?"; (2) fitness - "are you prepared to sustain a long rally time after time?"; (3) balance - "do you throw yourself off balance after certain strokes or sequences of strokes?... or after long rally after long rally?" Usually, players have decided how to play the opponent before the mathc begins, but the match sistuation may cause changes in their plans. Try to figure out the tactics being employed. What are they? If you were that player, would you have done the same? If the match goes three games, what advice would you give each player? The third game will show you if you were right.

In **doubles**, one team tries to force the other to lift the shuttle so it can be smashed. Watch how they do it - hitting the shuttle downwards off the serve, intercepting shuttles high at the net, playing a variety of net and flat shots rather than lifting, Once the shuttle is lifted, watch where the smasher hits it and where his partner positions himself to prevent the opponents from playing any net shots or flat shots off the smash. What shots are they playing? Are they staying deep in the court or aggressively attacking the smash close to the net?

In **mixed**, watch how the men try to take advantage of the opposing woman's position close to the net or try to force her into the backcourt. Watch how the women block shuttles at the net and try to force the opposing team to lift the shuttle. The key to mixed doubles is the woman.

If this is the first time you have watched a badminton match, here are a few hints which you may find useful.

Scoring - In badminton, the winner of a rally serves and only the server or the team serving can score points. Ladies Singles goes to 11 points with the option to set 12 points if the game is tied a 9-9 or 10-10. All other events go to 15 points with the option at 13-13 to set 18 or at 14-14 to set to 17. All events are played until one side has won two games.

Type of Shots - The smash is the badminton player's most formidable weapon. It is an overhead stroke delivered similarly to a powerful serve in tennis. However, you will see it used continually throughout the badminton rally with the shuttle leaving the racket at speeds in excess of 140 m.p.h. The drop is hit up to the point of contact identically to the smash and clear, thus creating a very effective change of pace. The clear, up to the point of contact like the drop and smash, forces the opposing player to the back of the court. The backhand strokes are identical to their equivalent forehand ones except they are usually hit with less power. However, these international stars will make all strokes seem easy.

If you have the opportunity, stand close to a court and watch the varying speeds of the shuttle from the blinding speed of a smash to the most delicate of net shots. Watch the players' remarkable defensive ability. Watch, too, their agility and quickness.

Come back again and bring your friends.






