

Arrangements have been made to have the Washington-Duke Hotel as headquarters for Wednesday's registrations up to midnight. If enough people indicate that they will be on hand Wednesday afternoon, a buffet supper, for a reasonable charge, will be arranged at the hotel, Wednesday evening.

At the time of registration, everyone will be given a map, showing all points of interest in town, including directions to Duke, and a diagram of the Duke grounds. At the University, there will be student guides (famous southern beauties, we are told) to show you around the campus and direct you to the gym, restaurants, etc.

It is planned to have an hour and a half period for lunch and supper to give players and officials a short rest. There are several fine restaurants on the campus, all reasonably priced.

BADMINTON BY TELEVISION

The Television Badminton Tournament, announced in our last number, has continued each Friday night during January and February.

Carl Loveday, Tournament Manager of C.B.S. Television, reports an enthusiastic public response. After each night's presentation, many phone calls were received at the studio commending the fine play. Many people who had never seen badminton before expressed keen interest and made inquiries about the game.

On Friday, January 16, Miss Betty Morse of New Haven, Connecticut, the number two ranking woman player in the East, defeated Miss Mary Hagan of Montclair, New Jersey, the number one player, 11-7; 9-11; 11-8, in the first real upset of the 1942 season. The winner was presented with the beautiful C.B.S. Silver Bowl.

Ken Davidson and Hugh Forgie, the International Exhibitionists, appeared on January 23rd. To open the program, they played Carl Loveday and Dr. William Giblin, the Atlantic Coast doubles champions. The "trick shot artists" were too much for the amateurs-- score 15-9; 17-16. The outstanding features of the match were the offensive shots of Ken Davidson, plus the retrieving ability of Loveday and Giblin. In a mixed doubles game, Mr. Davidson teamed up with Mrs. Wanda Bergman to defeat Hugh Forgie and Miss Helen Gibson, 15-12.

To top off an evening of brilliant badminton, Mr. Davidson and Mr. Forgie put on the act for which they are famous throughout the world. As usual, this brought a tremendous ovation, in the form of hundreds of phone calls to the studio.

Joe Zaharko, former Canadian Champion, played Carl Loveday on Friday, January 30. This match was arranged to determine how a top-ranking American player compared with a Canadian Champion. The match was forced to a conclusion by the end of the allotted time on the air, after each player had won one game, so nothing was actually decided. They will try again at an early date.

The badminton players of the U.S. are indebted to C.B.S. and Carl Loveday for one of the finest publicity jobs ever attempted.

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FROM NEW ENGLAND

Conn. vs. Mass.

The second annual interstate match between Conn. & Mass. was held in the Town Hall, Danielson, Connecticut, on Saturday, Jan. 10.

After struggling all afternoon and evening, the matches ended 8 all. The "Hot Stove League" will take charge from now until next year, in an effort to settle the dispute.

Three events were contested: women's doubles, men's doubles and mixed doubles. Each state team consisted of eight of the top-ranking "gals" and eight men.

One question was settled at this meet-- believe it or not, the Connecticut girls made a clean sweep of the women's doubles matches, whereas the Massachusetts men rode "rough shod" over the boys from Connecticut, winning all the men's doubles matches. This is probably an "all time, all something or other", and proves the "gals" from Connecticut are better players than the men and vice-versa. (or does it?)

The mixed doubles matches ended at 4 all, so they divided the trophies equally among the girls and called it a day.

The field was "star studded", so to speak, with Helen Gibson and Wanda Bergman, former national women's doubles champions; the famous Richardson twins, whose titles reach from Massachusetts to Connecticut, including several national championships; Leland Gustafson, present national veterans' champion; Fred Fullin, Conn. singles champion and Robert Wright, Mass. singles champion.

Leland Gustafson captained the Connecticut team and Johnnie Garrod led the Bay Staters. The Mass. captain bested his rival, winning his men's doubles match and losing the mixed, whereas Leland drew a blank in both events, although he forced his opponents to three gemes in each one.

Between the afternoon and evening matches, a supper was served at the Congregational Church. The proceeds were turned over to the Red Cross War Relief Fund. *********

The Eighth Annual Tedesco Invitational Men's Doubles Tournament was played January 24th and 25th.

Chicago District Championships

The Ninth Annual Chicago District Championships were held at Concordia College, River Forest, Ill. On February 12, 13 and 14. As in the past, they were under the auspices of the Chicago Badminton Club; and as usual, the event was smoothly handled and well attended.

There were 224 entries in five events. The early rounds were hard fought and produced many close games. As the field narrowed down, however, last year's champions were breezing right along.

The finals were practically a duplicate of last year; although with the exception of the two women's events, were more evenly matched and provided more thrills. Wilma Shortz is still tops in the women's division and shows no sign of relinquishing her crown.

The men's singles was a dog fight between John Prest and Bill Gibbs, teammates from C.B.C. Although only a two game match, it was a thriller. The boys brought the crowd to its feet with a roar several times, with volleys of 20 to 25 shots each. They were both in top form, with all their trick shots working. It was just a toss-up, Gibbs winning 15-12; 17-14.

Prest came back strong in the men's doubles with his new tournament partner, Bill Tewksbury. They extended Shortz and Conlan, seeded No. 1, to 3 games; but finally succumbed to the more experienced team.

The real thriller of the evening was the mixed doubles. For the first time in several years, the No. 1 seeded team of Shortz and Shortz were on the losing end of the score. Betty Agnew and John Prest played faultlessly and with supreme confidence. They made every shot count. From the middle of the first game, there was no doubt as to the outcome. It was written in a happy grin on their faces.

If there had been goal posts, they would surely have been torn down. As it was, the ushers were hard pressed to keep the rabid fans from working on the nets and supports.

Missouri A.C. Invitational

We are indebted to the St. Louis Post-Dispatch of Sunday, February 1, 1942, for as vivid a description of a badminton tournament as we have ever read. No feeble words of ours could improve upon it. We quote:

"A little game that had its origin (so we are told) when two boys met in an alley some hundred years ago and started batting a couple of bottle corks around, grew into man-sized proportions last night as the third annual Missouri Athletic Club Badminton Invitational came to a close."

"The tournament drew more of the ranking badminton players of the nation than the two previous ones, and the increased interest of these players and of a crowded gymnasium floor and gallery was substantial testimony to the sport."

"The crowd on hand for the finals last night were treated to quite a show, plus at least one major upset. In the men's singles, 31-year-old Dr. William J. Gibbs, lanky, sandyhaired Chicago representative and third ranking Midwest player, tripped up spectacled Jerry Burns, top-ranking Midwest and tenth ranking National singles star. The score was 9-15; 18-14;15-9."

"Probably the match most appreciated was the men's doubles, in which Burns came back, paired with the veteran doubles player, Harry W. Conlan, Chicago, to upset Dr. Gibbs and John Prest, Chicago, the defending champions in straight sets, 15-4 and 18-15. This was the first time that Burns and Conlan had teamed together, Burns' former partner now being in the military service." "A banquet was held last night for all the players and officials of the tournament, with Athletic Director Carl O. Bauer of the M.A.C. as toastmaster."

Requirements for entry -- to have never progressed beyond the first round in a major tournament. The early rounds will be played in various locations throughout the city, with the quarters, semi's and finals at some central point.

No definite date has been set-will probably be about the middle of April.

The Baylor University Open, held on January 15, 16 and 17 was a tremendous success. There were 331 entries - the largest turnout we have ever seen in the southwest. Entries were received from as far north as St. Louis and from Oklahoma, Louisiana and all parts of Texas.
