1953 SENIOR NATIONAL BADMINTON CHAMPIONSHIPS AT BOSTON

A large entry is expected for this year's National Badminton Championships which will be played at the University of Boston, March 31-April 4, 1953.

One of the special attractions is the possibility of return to National Tournament competition, after a four years absence, of Dave Freeman of Ann Arbor, Michigan, who was generally recognized as the outstanding Badminton player in the world in 1948-1949, when he won the 1948 UnitedStates Singles Championship for the sixth successive time, and was, co-holder of the 1948 United States Men's Doubles Championship for the fifth successive time, following which he won the 1949 All-England Singles Championship held in London, and the 1949 Danish Open Championship held in Copenhagen, as well as both of his Singles Matches in 1949 against Malaya in the Thomas Cup competition held in Glasgow, Scotland

Another of the special attractions is the opportunity for those attending the Tournament to become acquainted with the many places of historical importance in Boston and vicinity, which area has been well described as the birth-place of American independence. Visits will be possible not only to such famous places in Boston, itself as Bunker Hill and the Old North Church, but also Concord and Lexington.

Still a further special attraction will be the opportunity for many of the competitors to room under the same roof where the Tournament will be played. For those who are unableto be accommodated at the University Club, there are a number of excellent hotels situated close by. All of the Tournament activities will be centered at the University Club, which besides facilities for Badminton play, has a large number of bed-rooms (all with private bath) two ball rooms, ad equate dining facilities and a swimming pool (which will be open to contestants at specified times). The tournament Colonial Ball will be held Saturday night, April 3, at the University Club.

The University Club has been the center for many large Tournaments in the past, such as the famous "New Englands" in which many of the best Canadian players have competed, as well as all of the outstanding players in the East.

It is also fortunate that there is an unusually large number of experienced personnel in the immediate vicinity to run the Tournament.

The University Club Badminton courts will be available for practice Saturday, Sunday, and Monday before the Tournament opens.

The play Tuesday, March 31, will be confined to Ladies & Men's Singles, with Doubles play commencing Wednesday morning, April 1.

Those playing only in Veterans' Doubles need not register, earlier than 8:00 P.M., Thursday, April 2.

We are counting on your all out support, and anticipate with pleasure your attendance and full cooperation with our efforts to make this an outstanding event.

1953 JUNIOR NATIONAL BADMINTON CHAMPIONSHIPS AT SAN ANTONIO

The American Badminton Association announces that the Seventh Annual United States Junior Badminton Championships has been awarded to San Antonio, Texas and will be sponsored by the San Antonio Badminton Club. Serving as General Chairman will be Mr. Winchester Kelso while Mrs. B. F. (Bonnie) Pitman, Jr. will act as Co-Chairman.

The Tournament dates will be April 9th, 10th, 11th, 1953. Play will be held at Alamo Stadium Gymnasium which has a seating capacity of 6500 people. In addition to perfect facilities for badminton the gymnasium is also equipped with a press box thus permitting complete and prompt news coverage, of all events.

Mr. Ken Davidson, world famous professional star, will be present to put on one of his superb and inimitable badminton exhibitions.

A large entry from all parts of the United States is expected. Several of the National Titles will be undefended as the hdders have graduated from Junior ranks during the past year. Among those who have passed the age limit of 18 is Jack Chrisman of Burbank, California present triple title holder who holds the boys singles championship and shares the boys doubles title with Dean Maury of Manhattan Beach, California. Joan was runner up in the girls of Pasadena, California. Joan was runner up in the girls doubles event. Both Joan and Jean have also passed the age limit.

Judy Devlin of Baltimore, Md. will defend her girls singles championship as well as the girls doubles crown which she shares with Linda Cobb of Weston, Mass.. Other leading contenders expected to enter the Junior National Championships include Don Davis of Seattle, Wash., Dean Maury of Manhattan Beach, Calif. and Diane Myers, Carlene Hester and Gwen Garnsey of Pasadena, California.

Historical old San Antonio, Texas, home of the Alamo and cradle of Texas liberty will host the American Badminton Association National Junior Championships for 1953. As a special feature there will be held, in addition to and concurrently with the Junior Championships, the Alamo City Badminton Tournament, which will be limited to players who had not reached their fifteenth birthday prior to October 1, 1952. Each tournament will consist of the usual five events, plus consolation singles matches in each tournament.

As additional attractions there will be a Chuck Wagon Supper, a semi-formal dance, a historical tour which will include the Alamo, the Spanish Governor's Palace and many other points of interest, the Annual Luncheon plus the one and only Ken Davidson. Players will be housed with local families and arrangements have been made to house parents and chaperons at Motels and downtown Hotels.

BADMINTON IN NEW ZEALAND

THE 9th ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL INVITATION TOURNAMENT by Ken Davidson

The 9th Annual International Invitation Tournament held at Strathgowan Badminton Club, Toronto, Canada, on Jan-13-18, 1953, featured the return to action in Tournament of Dave Freeman (whose heuro surgery studies at Michigan U have kept him out of competition for almost four years) and Clint Stephens (whose recall to the Army kept him away from badminton circles for some 2 years) amidst a galaxy of stars never before gathered together at the same time under the one roof. Twelve USA and Canadian Thomas Cup Internationalists, and numerous National title holders of the fairer sex were drawn together at the invitation of Mr. Stuart Lawson, former President of the Canadian B.A., & owner of the Strathgowan B. C. His courage, and confidence, were rewarded when spectators flocked to each session of play.

Although there were a staggering number of great names present the main attraction to the Canadians was Dave Freeman, who had never before played across the border as evidenced by the programme saying, "To those of us in Canada who have never seen Dave play, he is a fabulous legend and we are looking forward to seeing him in the flesh."

Nor did Dave disappoint anyone. What a guy! Despite the fact that he didn't touch a racket for three years and only started to play, once a week, at the beginning of this season with his close friend, Joe Alston, he completed an incredible performance by winning the single's title without any player scoring any more than seven points in any one game, thus retaining an unbeaten single's record of not having lost a match since 1939!! The decisiveness of this comeback in such tough competition lends further proof to those of us who believe Dave is the greatest of all time in single's play.

There were many matches in the first round of this tournament which would have been worthy of the finals of the normal tournament. For example, Clint Stephens, a member of the USA Thomas Cup team in 1948-49, beat Gordie Simpson a Canadian Thomas Cupper, 15-3 in the third game only to run into the present USA Champion, Marten Mendez, in the second round. Bob Williams was unexpectedly beaten by Denmark's Number 6 Single's player, Mogens Kolle, who is in Washington, D. C. for one year in his country's diplomatic service.

The Dane had an interesting, and entertaining match with Dave Freeman in his next round and confessed his disappointment at getting only 5 and r points in his two games, un til after the final when he felt much more satisfied when he realized Joe Alston (semi-final) and Don Smythe (final) could each only total 10 points in their respective matches against Dave Freeman.

Don Smythe, the Canadian Champion, repeated his Thomas Cup victory (at Calgary) over Marten Mendez, USA Champ—ion, but this time in two straight sets, 18-14, 15-9; actually, this was a case of Marten losing rather than Don winning. For some unknown reason, Marten seemed to lose his control when it appeared he would win the first game, and again when leading Don at 7-5 in the second game by making unforced errors and his failure to keep the shuttle in play, he allowed Don to run from 5 to 12 in one series of serves with out any serious opposition.

In the other semi-final, Dave and Joe renewed their weekly battles, but this time before some 1,000 pairs of eyes. Joe, winner over Daryl Thompson (Canadian Champion in 1951) when Daryl had to retire when he tore some ligaments in his left-leg when behind to Joe in the second game at 10-13 (Daryl) won the first game at (15-8), madesome spectacular "gets" against Dave but he seemed over-anxious to do well and hurried his play rather than wait for the openings.

The long awaited meeting between Don Smythe and Dave Freeman had the 1,200 spectators applauding right from the start. In the early stages, the rallies were long and the points bitterly contested, the first point going to Freeman, following many deep clears and close drop-shots, with a perf-

ectly executed deceptive straight-down the-line backhand drive catching the Canadian off-balance. This did not upset him, and he cooly and deliberately set about running Dave around the court, showing excellent strategy and consistent stroking. To those of us who have seen Dave Freeman in action since 1938 it was noticeable that he was not quite so consistent in his concentration as before and it appeared he was slightly perturbed at himself for "giving away a cheap point" when he returned Don's serve at 1-3 well over the sideline.

Once Dave let his mind dwell solely on the game at hand, he again began to unfold the magic of his game and his commover each rally became more dominant, and he went on to win the first game at 15-7.

With this first game safely booked, Dave's confidence was restored to its highest level and the spectators were treated to some almost flawless play. Many have thought that Dave is a purely defensive player. Although his defense is almost impregnable and, in the main, responsible for the few points scored against him, Dave continuously keeps the pressure on his opponents by keeping them off balance and giving them little chance to play shots of their choice. This constant pressure is a form of attach just as deadly as any other although not so obvious as the blasting of a powerful overhead smash.

Fine player though Don Smythe is, and notwithstanding his top form and strong smashing, it became increasingly more difficult for him to score points and his steadiness began to break under the controlled placement of a Freeman now completely in command. Dave domineered each rally and the match drew to its inevitable conclusion with the Canadian spectators heartily applauding their unbelief at witnessing their National Champion's stout-hearted efforts garnering no more than points in the second game of a match which gave final proof that Dave Freeman is something out of the ordinary even to the ranks of champions.

Although it is doubtful that Dave will ever again reach the mental and physical heights he set for himself in 1948-49 when he won all his Thomas Cup matches and gained a world title by winning the All-England Single's Championship in London, England, against all the top convincing players from Malaya, India, Denmark and many other countries, Dave's performance in Canada against such strong opposition strengthens the claims of those who believe that, with Dave in the USA Thomas Cup team, he would have led his country to victory against the strong Malayan team in Singapore last May-June. Be that as it may, there is little doubt that Dave Freeman is still the Number 1 Single's player in the world today.

Another display of almost errorless badminton was also being carried on in the Ladies' singles competition by the six-time USA Champion, Ethel Marshall, who beat Patsey Stephens in the final with the loss of only 3 points. Patseyhad earlier beaten the 1951 Canadian Champion, Marge Shedd, while Ethel was beating Judy Devlin, 11-5, 11-2, in the other semi-final. The young Junior Champion from Baltimore set off with a 3-0 lead in the first game but, from there on, she fell prey to the strategy of her more experienced opponent, who mercilessly moved Judy around the court to take advantage of her superior speed of foot.

Ethel has dominated the Ladies Singles events on the North-American Continent for the past six years and it is to be hoped that some way may be found, while she is in the prime of her career, to have her prove that she is the best in the world. Since there is no competition for females similar to the Thomas Cup for men the only possibility of her meeting any other ladies with a right to such a claim would seem to be a visit to Europe to compete against the Danish girls in either the All-Englands in London or the Danish Championships in Copenhagen. (The Danish girls have dominated play in Europe since the war and proved better than the best in South Africa or Australasia. The Malayan, Indian or other Pacific Ladies are still well below the standard of the best Europeans or Americans.)

USA representative completed a clean sweep in all the doubles events.

the Canadian Champions, Don Smythe and Bud Porter, in two straight games. After a close first game, 15-12, in which they retained the lead throughout, the American pair ran away with the second game with surprisingly little opposition. Their toughest match was against another American pair, Bob Williams and R. Hardison, in the semis. 

BADMINTON IN FRANCE

o me Paris is everything that has ever been written about it and much more besides and when such great describers (is there such a word) as Lawrence Sterne and Elliot Paul have tried to portray the charm and diversity of the city (and nearly succeeded) who am I to have a go? I will, however, expend a few moments of your time in saying a few words about the people at the top of badminton in France-the people who help to make my annual pilgrimage so wonderful)

First of all there is Rene Mathieu. He is the man most responsible for the increasing interest in France in the game you and I love. He is a colourful character who has worked very very hard to get things moving again. Monsieur Mathieu, (who is married to Simone Mathieu that world ranking tennis player of the thirties) is the 'Directeur'.

(I suppose Editor is an approximate translation of the title) of the magazine "Smash" which is, 'La Revie Francaise de Lawn-Tennis, de Badminton, de Ping-Ball (whatever that is!!) et de Tennis de Table. Badminton in France as yet does not rate a magazine all by itself. One of the other people who, like M. Mathieu are all so wonderfully hospitable to all foreign visiting badminton players is Michel Marret. In a recent Thomas Cup match official hand-out Michel-Marret was described as ''Captain of the French team; French international player; many times French doubles champion. Very spectacular and clever but nevertheless a specialist in wood shots! I hope I have translated this fairly well. I think I have; I can imagine M. Mathieu and Michel Marret thoroughly enjoying devising this press handout especially as another very good friend of mine, the irrepressible Michel Le Renard, is described as a notablebreaker of rackets. But to return to Michel Marret. No one who has taken part in a post war French Championship will forget the wonderful informal parties that Michel and his wife Jaqueline gave in their flat after the official dinner that follows the finals. Michel Marret has been a leading tennisplayer not so long ago and in this respect he is like France's Number One Badminton player, Henri Pelizza, for some ten years, who is now being very hard pressed for his position by young Paul Ailloud, a very gifted player who needs only regular play against foreign opposition to become a formidable player in any company.

These are only a few among many grand people who gave the visitors from England such a wonderful time each year.



1st TIMPE TOURNEY AT BURBANK






