# Governor Broughton To Open Badminton Matches Thursday

Governor J. Melville Broughton will bat out the first bird to officially open the sixth annual United States Badminton Championships in the gymnasium on Thursday when almost 300 of the nation's foremost players from nearly every state in the Union gather for the three-day tournament.

Students who wish to attend the matches may get special student rates on their tickets, twenty-five cents plus student athletic book for admission to each of the evening sessions according to an announcement by Dayton Dean, business manager of athletics. Admission to the Thursday afternoon activities and any games which may be played on Friday afternoon will be free to the public, Dean said.

Big question of the tournament is who, if anybody, is going to stop triple king Dave Freeman. Out of the running because they are serving with the armed forces are number two player Ken Quigley, number four man John Murphy, and Southern tournament men's singles champion Johnny Ager, former star of the Duke tennis team.

Ken Davidson and Hugh Forgie, English-Canadian professional badminton stars who amazed a huge gallery with their "Flying Feathers" act last month on the Duke-North Carolina basketball card, will return to Durham to repeat their show for customers at the National Championships.

Freeman appears to be unchallenged for supremacy this year, particularly in the men's singles division, and if he drops any one of his three titles, it is

most likely to be the mixed doubles. His style is described as "a combination of fly-swatting, tumbling, and Comanche war dance," and he is noted for spending half his time on the floor, making as many impossible shots from there as he does on his feet and yelling with delight when he makes a good shot. He seldom practices because, as he says, "It isn't fun, therefore, I don't do it."

Among the women, Evelyn Boldrick, UCLA student who won the national singles crown in 1940, is favored to regain it this season while Julia Pickens, from Charlotte, is making a bid for the title in the women's doubles division.

Opening-round play begins Thursday morning, April 2, and will continue through Friday and Saturday, April 3 and 4. The large California contingent of competitors arrived in Durham yesterday, headed by champion Freeman. About half of the field of 300 is expected to register from various Southern states before play opens on Thursday.

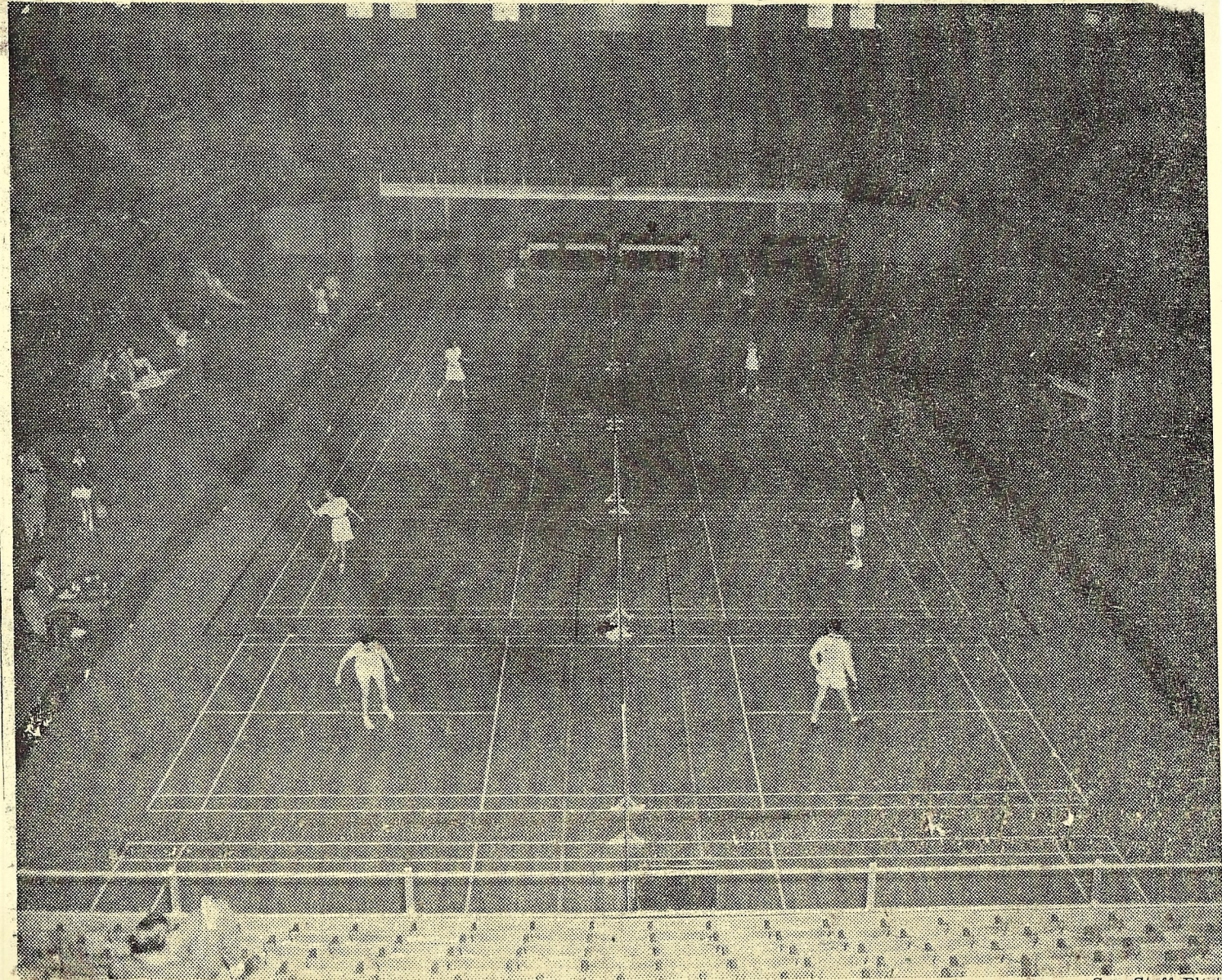


## Governor To Open Badminton Tourney

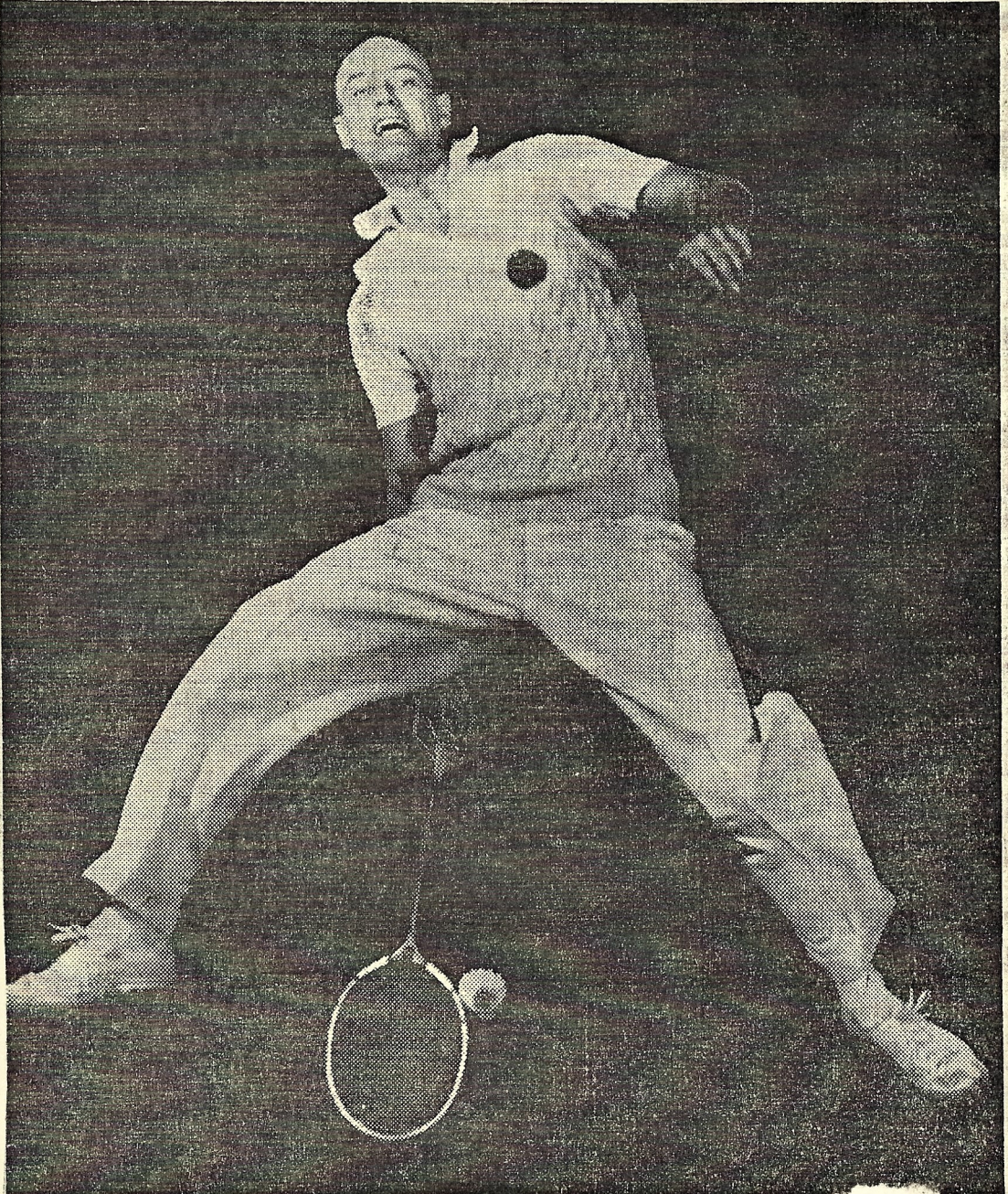
THE CORK-AND-FEATHER set began play here today in the National Badminton Tournament with a field of nearly 100 on hand for the three-day event. The tourney is being held

## Badminton Favorites Triumph

### Play Continues In National Meet At Duke

DURHAM, April 3.—(AP)—Dave Freeman, of Pasadena, Calif., seeking his fourth straight men's singles title, will meet Carl Loveday, of Montclair, Ind., in the finals of the sixth annual United States badminton championships.

Freeman, Pomona college senior, bettered his doubles partner, Chet Goss, of Hollywood, Calif., 15-1, 15-1 in tonight's semifinals. Loveday was hard pressed to defeat Ken Quigley, of Cleveland in a spectacular match 15-13, 15-11.

Top-seeded Evelyn Boldrick, of San Diego, Calif., the defending champion, conquered Patsy Donovan, of Buffalo, N. Y., 11-0, 11-6 in the women's singles semifinals and will meet another Californian, Janet Wright, in the finals.

Third-seeded Miss Wright, who hails from San Francisco, upset Mary Whittemore Schlemm, No. 2 player, from Boston, Mass., 6-11, 11-6, 12-9 in the other semifinals match.

Miss Boldrick, U. C. L. A. coed, and Miss Wright are partners in the women's doubles.

Freeman and Goss trounced Gustavson, of Westport, Conn., and F. N. Hind, of New York, 15-3, 15-4. Bill Faversham and Wayne Schell, the Boston, Mass., tandem seeded No. 2, joined Freeman and Goss in the semi-finals by winning over Adolph Sack, of Montclair, N. J., and Herman Oppenheim, of Mt. Vernon, N. Y., 15-8 and 17-4.

The No. 3 combination—Ken Quigley, of Cleveland, and Harry Conlan, of Philadelphia, triumphed over Stig Larson and Fritz Jasenski, of Connecticut, 18-5, 15-13.

The unseeded Philadelphia entry, Bill Warner and Harry Hackett, eliminated Robert Williams and Roderick Grieg, both of Niagara Falls, N. Y., 15-7, 15-7.

Freeman and Goss were paired with Quigley and Conlan tonight and Warner and Hackett were matched with Faversham and Schell.

In the women's doubles, Evelyn Boldrick, of San Diego, Calif., and Janet Wright, of San Francisco, Calif., top seeded, beat Julia Pickens, of Charlotte, and Ruth Jett, of San Diego, 15-7, 15-9.

Mary Whittemore Schlemm, of Boston, and Patsy Donovan, of Buffalo, N. Y., seeded No. 2, defeated Shirley Lander and Helen Zabriskie, the San Francisco team, 15-8, 10-15, 15-11.

Mrs. Roy Bergman, of Westport, Conn., and Helen Gibson, of Stamford, Conn., seeded No. 3, eliminated Wilma Shortz and Eleanor Coombs, of Chicago, 15-4, 15-5; and fourth seeded Mary Hagan, of Montclair, N. # Quarter-Final Matches Set For Tonight

## Dave Freeman And Eveyn Bolderick Among Winners

Only a mild upset in the men's doubles nudged the proverbial dope bucket yesterday as the nation's top-flight amateurs played through to the quarter-final rounds in the five divisions of the sixth annual United States badminton championships.

All day long, they batted the birds across the glittering hardwood of Duke University's spacious gymnasium. And from start to finish, the slender, wiry figure of King David Guthrie Freeman dominated the scene.

It was Freeman—the blond Pomona College senior who hails from Pasadena, Calif., and is seeking his fourth "grand slam" in the nationals—who lured the crowds to his court and drew the applause. And so far, the tournament has produced no one to challenge the supremacy he has enjoyed since an April night in 1939.

Freeman advanced in the men's singles by first blasting Dean Hammond of Charlotte, 15-0, 15-3, and then doing a workmanlike job on Pete Snyder of Philadelphia, 15-4, 15-3. His opponent today will be Harry Conlan of Chicago.

Freeman advanced in the men's doubles with sterling help from Partner Chester Goss of Hollywood by stifling Jim Crafts and Nelson Howard from Boston in a second-round match, 15-2, 15-5. The California boys, who drew a bye in the first round, meet Lea Gustavson, Westport, Conn., and F. N. Hinds of New York in today's pairings.

### BREEZES THROUGH

And Freeman—with his pretty sidekick, Sally Williams, who also comes from Pasadena—breezed through the first two rounds of the mixed doubles by walloping Bill Shreve and Charlotte Decker of Washington, D. C., 15-7, 15-1, and Fritz Jasenski of Greenwich, Conn., and Helen Zabriskie, San Francisco, 15-4, 15-11. Freeman and Miss Williams played today and Helen Gibson

## Freeman Gets Clean Sweep In Badminton

DURHAM — (AP) — David Guthrie Freeman, the Pomona College student from Pasadena, Calif., is the national badminton champion for the fourth time. In addition, he is co-holder of the men's doubles and mixed doubles titles.

He became the singles champion again Saturday night by defeating Carl Loveday of Montclair, N. J., 15-5, 15-10, in the finals of the U. S. championships here.

Freeman teamed with Chester Goss of Hollywood, Calif., to defeat Bill Faversham and Wayne Schell, the Boston pair, in the doubles finals, 15-10, 15-7. Then Freeman and Sally Williams, also of Pasadena, defeated Loveday and Mary Hagan of Montclair, 15-13, 7-15, 15-9, in the mixed doubles finals.

Evelyn Boldrick of San Diego, Calif., regained the women's singles crown with a 12-10, 11-3 victory over Janet Wright of San Francisco. Miss Boldrick won the title in 1940 but lost in the 1941 finals to Thelma Kingsbury of England, who did not compete here.

Lealand Gustavson of Westport, Conn., and F. N. Hinds of New York won the veterans' doubles title by defeating Don Richardson of Brookline, Mass., and Phil Richardson of Boston, 15-9, 5-15, 17-16.

Miss Boldrick and Miss Wright won the women's doubles title with a 17-15, 15-10 victory over a Connecticut duo, Mrs. Roy Bergman of Westport and Helen Gibson of Stamford.

# Tourney Comes To Close Here In Duke Gym

## Boldrick To Face Wright In Final Women's Contest

They'll be playing the finals of the sixth annual United States Badminton championships out at Duke Gymnasium tonight. The starting time is 8 o'clock, and those who like their badminton—and those who are rapidly learning to like it—are bound to be there.

In those championship matches, the devotees of the bird-hopping game will see one of the greatest amateur performers to whack away with a racket since those slightly-indisposed English officers had their great awakening almost half a century ago.

He's slight of build, blond of hair, inclined to give the gallery-ites their show. He's the Babe Ruth-Bobby Jones-Big Bill Tilden of badminton. And unless there's an upset of astounding proportions, he'll win his fourth straight national singles title in the Blue Devil barn tonight.

David Guthrie Freeman's his name. In his march to the finals of the men's singles division, he has bowled over four opponents, yielding no more than 4 points in any one game. He's lost only 16 points, all told.

### GIVES NO MERCY

Last night in the semi-finals, the young man from Pasadena, Calif., showed his doubles partner and fellow-Californian, Chester Goss, no mercy. He walloped the lanky Hollywood entrant, 15-1, 15-1, pulling every shot out of the bag, just as he did in eliminating Harry Conlan of Chicago in the quarter-finals yesterday morning.

Freeman's championship opponent tonight will be the slick-haired youngster from Montclair, N. J., Carl Loveday, seeded No. 2 and capable of giving Dave a brush. But tournament observers figure Loveday will do little more than that.

Loveday got where he is by bouncing out Harry Hackett of Philadelphia in the quarter finals and then outlasting courageous Ken Quigley, the Army airman from Cleveland, last night, 15-13, 15-11.

Hence, to the lovely ladies.

The national championship in the women's singles will be decided tonight by a couple of California lasses—Evelyn Boldrick of San Diego and Janet Wright of San Francisco.

Miss Boldrick's presence on fame's doorstep is no surprise. She won the title in 1940, and since Thelma Kingsbury, who beat her in last year's finals, is not among those present this year, beautiful Boldrick is the heavy favorite.

She copped her semi-finals match with not too much exertion, beating Patsy Donovan, the popular Iris Hgill from Buffalo, N. Y., 11-0, 11-6. In the quarter-finals yesterday morning, she trounced Claire Mitchell of Philadelphia, 11-0, 11-1.

But Miss Wright, seeded No. 3 had to pull an upset to earn the right to meet her doubles partner for the top honors. She had to whip Mrs. Mary Whittemore Schlemm, second-seeded and a former national titleholder, in last night's penultimates.

### HAS THE STUFF

But Janet had the stuff. She dropped the first game to the Boston southpaw, 6-11, but came back to win the second, 11-6. After a five-minute rest, they went at it again. With the score tied at 9—all, Miss Wright ran out the three winning points with a splendid exhibition of class.

The seedings stood up in the men's doubles. Defending Champions Freeman and Goss, by winning over Quigley and Conlan in the semi-finals, will tangle tonight with the second-seeded tandem of Bill Faversham and Wayne Schell, both of Boston, who batted out a hard-fought victory over Bill Warner and Harry Hackett of Philadelphia.

There was a minor upset in the women's doubles. Mrs. Roy Bergman of Westport, Conn., and Helen Gibson of Stamford, Conn., won a spectacular decision over the second-ranking team of Mrs. Schlemm and Miss Donovan, 17-14, 6-15, 15-11.

The Nutmegers tonight will make their bid against the top-seeded combination of Miss Boldrick and Miss Wright, who advanced to the finals by battering down Mary Hagan of Montclair, N. J., and Claire Mitchell, 15-12, 15-1.

In the mixed doubles, the defending title team—Dave Freeman (you guessed it) and Sally Williams, who also hails from Pasadena—topped Stig Larson of Cos Cob, Conn., and Claire Mitchell, Philadelphia, 15-8, 18-13.
