

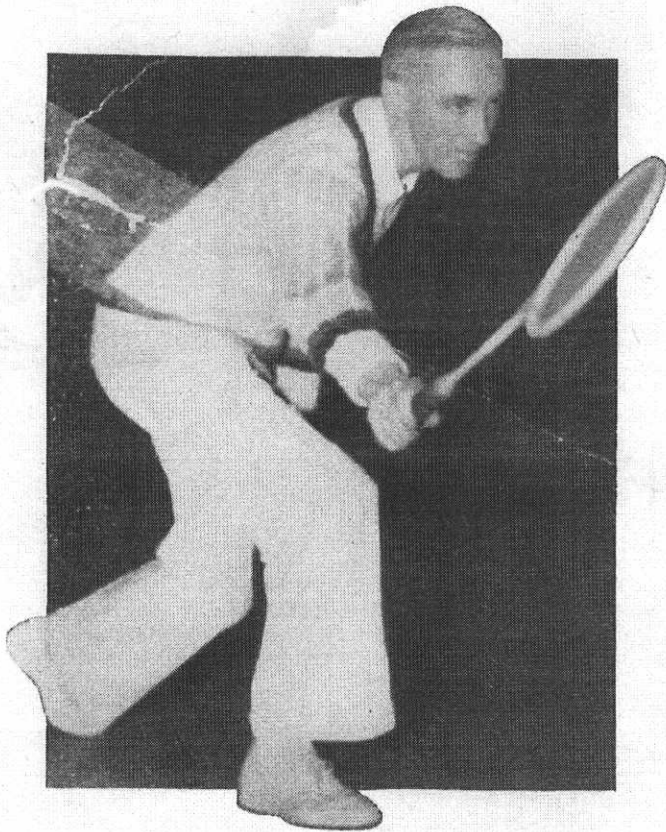

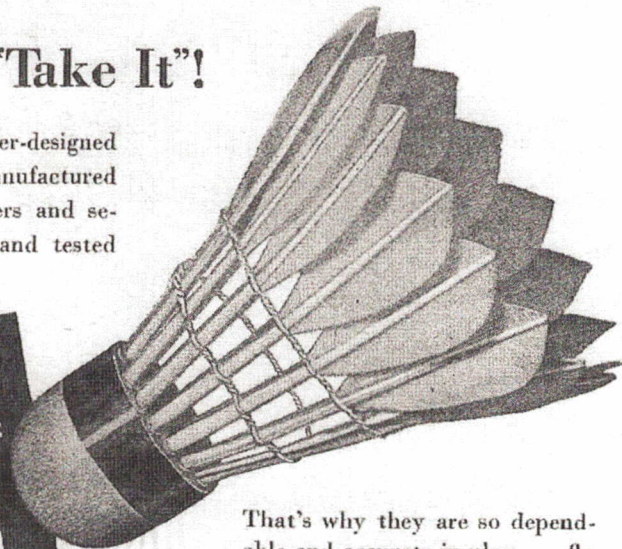

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## BADMINTON FACTS

The game of badminton is reputed to have started in India the latter part of the 1800's, though some records appear to show that a game of similar nature was played earlier in China and there is also some mention of the game as far back as the twelfth century at one of the Courts of the reigning English king.

Its origin is based around a story of English army officers, after a somewhat convivial dinner, placing quills in champagne corks and batting them back and forth over a table.

On the return of some of the officers to England it was expanded into an outdoor game at the castle of the Duke of Beaufort. The ancestral hall of the Duke was called "Badminton Hall," hence the name the game bears today.

Intermittent play spread throughout the British Isles until 1898 when their first National Championships were held.

It was a natural sequence for it to reach Canada but nothing of any importance happened until after the first World War. Its real impetus came as a result of a tour through Canada by a visiting English Team in 1925. Today it is a ranking major sport.

New York City has the oldest club in constant operation in the world today but real American activity did not develop until about 1927. It is interesting to note that this date marked a decided swing to the

game on opposite coasts, Boston and Seattle, due unquestionably to the nearby Canadian contacts. Rapid growth spread through leading centers and a national association came into being in 1936 with the first National Championships being held in Chicago in April, 1937.

All indications point to the game's approaching a point where it will take its place among the larger major American sports, just as it has in Canada, England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, France, Malaya, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and many other countries.

For those unfamiliar with certain technicalities of the badminton game, the following points are offered for your clarification:

*Scoring*—15 points to a game—deuce games may be set for 5 points at 13 all or 3 points at 14 all. Points are scored only by the side serving. In doubles, each player on each side serves until "put out," changing sides each time a point is won—exception—side serving first in each game has only one serve.

*Serving*—Must be an underhand serve no higher than the waist.

*Wood Shots and Carries*—Wood shots are permissible but distinct hits must be made and "birds" hitting racket twice or if slung or carried are called "carries" and constitute a fault.

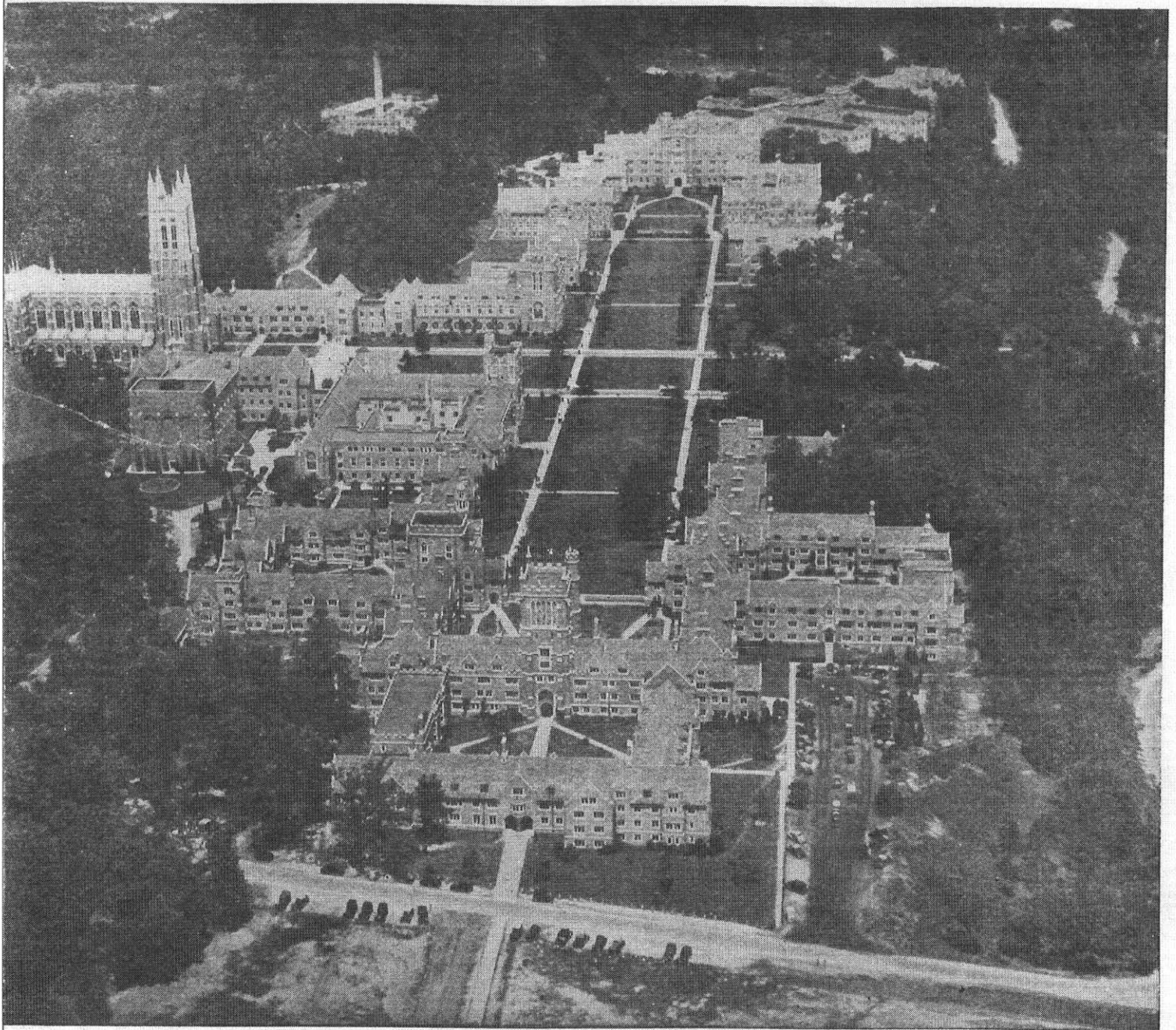
