

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

### Some Features of the 1902 All-England Picture

The handicap events are in progress. In those days all the best players took part in them at all of the few open tournaments then held, and so, on the front two courts can be seen many of the best exponents of 50 years ago.

In the front court are, left to right, R. B. Ransford and A. D. Prebble v. S. M. Massey and A. V. Cowley. In the middle court are, also left to right, Mrs. Sterry and Miss E. M. Moseley v. Miss D. K. Douglass (later Mrs. Lambert Chambers of immortal Lawn Tennis fame) and Miss St. John.

Others dimly recognisable in the picture are Sir George Thomas (standing on the umpire's chair in the centre), Mr. G. W. Vidal, then hon. secretary of the Badminton Association (in white trousers and a hat between the courts), and Mr. J. H. E. Hart, already then a famous doyen of the game, who is dispensing shuttles behind the court where the four ladies have interrupted their match for the photographer's benefit.

# Then and Now


It is a far cry to 1902, but the comparison with 1952 which the accompanying photographs afford must be of great interest to all concerned with the game.

Fifty years ago the All-England championships were in their fourth year, and after having been held in a drill hall in the City of London for the previous three years, they were transferred to the Central Transept of the Crystal Palace, where more space and courts were available. The meeting, however, was not regarded with the success hoped for.

In its report of the tournament, Lawn Tennis, which at the time devoted quite a bit of space to Badminton affairs and had a most competent Badminton editor, reported that: "we think there were very few players who did not wish themselves back at the old hall, and we feel sure no effort will now be spared to hold all

future meetings in London, the comparatively small attendance being no doubt due to the fact that the Crystal Palace is very uncentral." The only apparent redeeming feature of the Crystal Palace was the fact that it had all the space desired. Indeed, six courts, in contrast to the three at the previous venue, were marked out.

The tournament extended over three days, 18th, 19th and 20th March, and for the first time players from Ireland and Scotland took part. We are also advised by the same writer that "the play was hardly up to last year's standard, this being no doubt due to the difficulty of following the shuttle, owing to the light being very trying to the eyes." It is also stated with satisfaction that among the spectators was "no less a personage than Dr. W. G. Grace."

# England v. Denmark

Danes are Strong Favourites to Win European Zone Final

As was the case three years ago, England and Denmark will meet in the final of the European zone of the Thomas Cup. The tie takes place at Sale, near Manchester, on Monday and Tuesday, 17th and 18th March, just before the All-England championships. Three years ago, when the Danes were met at Copenhagen, the visitors won only one game in the nine matches contested. This time it may be expected that the result will be a little less one-sided, though he would be a bold man to back England to beat her formidable foes.

The Danes have nominated Poul Holm, Jorn Skaarup, Ole Jensen, Ib Olesen, John Nygaard and Jorgen Hammergaard Hansen for the tie. It may be anticipated that Holm, Skaarup and Jensen will play the singles and that Holm and Jensen and Olesen and Nygaard will compose the two doubles pairs.

At the moment of writing the England team has not been announced, but it may be assumed that it will show little difference from that which was successful over the Scots in the previous round. The team then was N. B. Radford, K. R. Greasley and H. R. Marsland in the singles, with H. J. Wingfield and W. Shute and Marsland and Greasley as the doubles pairs. A. D. Jordan was the sixth man.

It seems unlikely that we shall win any of the four major singles, but if Marsland can produce the form he showed at Notingham it is possible that he may have a very close encounter with Jensen in the

third-string match. Should the Danes prefer Hammergaard for this clash, then Marsland's chances should be increased, for it may be mentioned in the Yorkshire-man's favour that Hammergaard played the third role against Sweden and was defeated by Knut Malmgren, a player who is certainly not above the capabilities of Marsland at his best.

The Danes rank Olesen and Nygaard as their best doubles pair, and these two have certainly done well enough together to merit the honour. The other pair, Holm and Jesep while perheas mere heililest. and Jensen, while perhaps more brilliant, is less reliable, and the combination has been defeated several times by other Scandinavian pairs. As an instance, the Swedes, Nils Jonson and Stellan Mohlin, upset them twice a year ago, yet these same Swedes were handsomely defeated by Greasley and Marsland at Southend last March, and should also have been beaten on the same day by Wingfield and Shute. Thus, it might be hoped that an English success could be brought about in this department of the tie. But if this is to happen the English pairs will have to be at their best. As a further encouragement, it is of interest to recall that F. W. Peard and J. J. FitzGibbon of Ireland defeated both Danish pairs in the Thomas Cup clash between Ireland and Denmark last November, though neither Danish pair then was composed of the same players as this time. Jensen did not play then and nor did Nygaard, but that fact must not detract from the Irish successes.

# All-England Prospects


Malayans and Danes should again be the principal Protagonists for All-England Honours—England's Chances of Doing Well are Improving

Once again the All-England Championships are upon us, and once again the entries from the various Badminton playing countries have confirmed that the meeting is regarded as the principal tournament in the world despite the fact that it seems still only a hope that any of the titles will be gained by home players. Nevertheless, even if England does not succeed this year, there are unmistaken signs that amongst the entries are already certain players from the home country who should within the next year or two make their presence felt amongst our annual guests from overseas and bring home some of the honours of the day before very long.

There are several notable points about the 42nd All-England Championships which cannot be lightly passed over. On the administrative side is the fact that before the chief contestants get together at the Empress Hall from 19th to 22nd March, there will have been some highly competitive play during the previous weekend at the Lensbury and Britannic House Club where the eliminating tests of those not accepted straight into the main meeting will be taking place. These qualifying rounds were bound to come in time with the continually increasing number of players desirous of taking part in the All-England. It is far better to stage such contests and thus give all an opportunity of proving their worth than to decline entries on the score of excess. The names of the entrants who have been excused these preliminary rounds will be found quoted elsewhere. To them will be added the specified number of successful quali-fiers. One or two of the qualifiers may well get through a round or so at the Empress Hall, and good luck to them if they can. Others amongst their number will gain the reward of meeting some of the seeded stars at once. Notable here is that one such will have the privilege of a singles match against the great Wong Peng Soon, an opportunity not easily obtained.

The seeded players are also listed in these pages, and they are quoted in the order in which they appear in the actual draw, not, be it noted, in any ranking order. Thus, if the anticipations of the tournament committee are confirmed, the last eight in the men's singles will line up as indicated.

Noteworthy is the fact that an English lady is seeded in the singles for the first time in four years. This may be taken as a significant recognition of the rise of the younger generation in England, Miss Elisabeth O'Beirne well merits, on her recent play, the privilege accorded her. She has thus the opportunity of being the first Englishwoman to reach the semi-final of the singles since 1939. Indeed, it is perhaps a dismal thought that thirteen years have elapsed since we have had a semi-finalist in this event. In all five postwar tournaments there has been but one player who was not a Dane who has played a ladies' singles semi-final! The exception was Miss Nancy Fleming of New Zealand who reached that stage two years ago. But Miss O'Beirne has no easy task in aspiring to the expectation, for in

her first match she has to oppose Frk Edel Christensen, a newcomer from Copenhagen, and if successful then she should find the four-time Swedish champion, Fru Amy Petersson, waiting for her in the round of the last eight. It can be anticipated, however, that Miss O'Beirne will triumph over both these opponents, and she will then have another opportunity of playing against the holder, Frk Aase Jacobsen, against whom the Sussex lady launched such a fine challenge a year ago. The other half should lie between the Danes, Fru Tonny Ahm and Fru Aase Winther, the outcome of whose expected meeting must be somewhat problematical on previous results. Fru Winther will be remembered by her maiden name of Frk Aase Svendsen and as one of the formidable quartet of Denmark's top players in recent seasons. We shall miss the former Frk Kirsten Thorndahl's participation, but she has not been very fit recently, and has thus decided not to come over this season.

It is a pity that Miss Iris Cooley and Mrs. A. M. Horner should have to meet in the first round, for both of them might have, at their very best, disturbed the hitherto serene paths of Danish ladies to the final stages; the winner of this Anglo-Scottish clash should qualify to oppose Fru Winther in the third round.

In the men's singles, Wong Peng Soon, out to make the challenge trophy his own personal property by a third straight win, must start as a hot favourite. He has in his eighth of the draw Ole Jensen, one of Denmark's Thomas Cup players, and then F. W. Peard of Ireland should, according to the seeding, meet him for a place in the semi-final round. Wong, however, should defeat both of these players, but he will be called upon to produce his best against the winner of Nils Jonson, the diminutive Swede, and H. A. Heah of Malaya. It is a pity that these two should have to clash,

for both have been playing extraordinarily well in recent weeks. Jonson's form in the Thomas Cup tie at Copenhagen when he upset both Jorn Skaarup and Poul Holm in the singles, is described by Swedish authorities as far above what he has previously shown. Indeed, it is understood that on those two days last month he displayed form worthy of Wong Peng Soon's steel. This says perhaps a lot, but Nils Jonson is a great sticker, a wonderful favourite with the gallery, and undoubtedly a schemer. His meeting with Heah should last a long time, for both are somewhat similar in their styles of play. On stamina one must concede that the little Swede will have a big advantage, but he will have to work hard to overcome the remarkably accurate play of the man from Penang who has several times overcome Eddy Choong this season. This Thursday match should be more than well worth seeing.

In the other half, the enterprising and magnetic Poul Holm has the honour of "top seed." To reach the semi-final he requires to repeat his Thomas Cup win over Sweden's champion, Inge Blomberg, who gave the great Wong Peng Soon something to think about a year ago. In the semi-final he will find, unless some unexpected upset should prevent, game little Eddy Choong waiting to repeat his Glasgow success over the Danish champion. That is the only time these two have ever met in singles. Last November the Malayan acquired the means to defeat his rival. Whatever happens here, this match should certainly be the most spectacular clash of all the singles.

One fears that in the men's singles England's best seem again unlikely to reach the last few rounds. Noel Radford will find it probably beyond him to concede twenty years to Blomberg, and K. R. Greasley has not entered. Nor has H. R. Marsland. H. J. Wingfield comes up against Heah quite early, and A. D. Jordan is unlikely to disturb the calculating Nils Jonson. Warwick Shute meets Ole Jensen in his first match; the Kent man might succeed in hitting through the

defences of the Dane for he has done this sort of thing before though he has always been unable to last the pace of a third game in this way. Maurice Robinson will probably find E. B. Choong a little too much, but J. D. McColl has a good chance of gaining the last eight, though the going will be hard, what with Ove Eilertsen of Denmark and Knut Malmgren of Sweden in the way.

Anticipations in the men's doubles are difficult to assess, for many of the English pairs are of the scratch variety, a great pity, but in the ladies' event it will be interesting to see what those coming young Surrey players, the Misses Iris Cooley and June White, can do when up against Fru Winther and Frk Christensen. Likewise, Mrs. K. M. Henderson and Mrs. M. R. Wyatt should give a good account of themselves against the top Danish couple, Fru Tonny Ahm and Frk Aase Jacobsen, when they meet in their anticipated semi-final. Mrs. Uber and Mrs. Allen Webber ought certainly to reach the semi-final where they should meet the second Danish pair.

Poul Holm and Fru Ahm will be out to remove the mixed cups by a fourth victory. They are still regarded in Denmark as that country's leading pair even if they have recently undergone defeats here and there.

As a general assessment, it must be granted that four of the holders look like succeeding again, though there must be an exception in the ladies' doubles due to Fru Lossmann's non-participation.

### The All-England Order of Play

The general order of play in the All-England Championships will be as usual. On the Wednesday both singles events will proceed as far as the last eights, and so will the mixed doubles. The effect here is that there may well be cases of seeded players being eliminated on the first day! On the Thursday, the singles semi-finalists will be established, the men's doubles will proceed to the last eight and the ladies' even further to the semi-final round.

Friday's play will embrace the outstanding men's doubles matches and the semi-finals of all five events. The obstacles which existed to cause arrangements to be made for the final of the ladies' doubles to be played on the Friday have now been removed, so that all the finals are now scheduled for the Saturday afternoon.

Play commences on Wednesday at 3.30 p.m. on Thursday at 4 p.m., and on Friday at 6 p.m. In each case, it will con-clude between 10 and 10.30 p.m. The finals on Saturday will commence at 2 o'clock. The veteran's doubles, for which as many as 19 pairs have entered, will be staged from 3 p.m. on the Friday after-

### A Great Pity

We are sorry that Mrs. Kae Grant, the reigning Canadian champion, will not after all be competing in the All-England Championships. Ever since she arrived here Mrs. Grant has not been too fit, and due to medical advice she had to give up playing just when she needed the practice. Mrs. Grant has been able to play very little since last November, and she felt that it would be fairer to her country, whose flag she was expected to bear, if she did not enter when it became obvious that she was bound to be badly out of practice.

We in this country are extremely sorry that the anticipated entry of Canada's champion could not be carried out. We have had no Canadian participation in the All-England Championships since W. R. Walton won our singles title in 1939. We can only extend to Mrs. Grant our best wishes for the future and the hope that next year she will be able to come back and give us the pleasure of her active participation.

# The B.A. Dinner and Dance is on 22nd March

The sixth annual dinner and dance of the Badminton Association of England will take place on Saturday, 22nd March, after the final day's play in the All-England Championships. The venue will be the private suite at the Criterion Restaurant, Piccadilly, London, W.

Amongst the large attendance expected again at this big function will be all the overseas players coming to England for the Championship meeting. They will be the guests of the B.A. of England.

### An England Team has been invited to South Africa

The Badminton Association of England has received an invitation to send a mixed team to South Africa during the English summer months of 1953. The invitation is extended for a team of three men and three ladies who will be absent on the tour for a period embracing 66 days in all, which includes travel by Union Castle Liner in both directions. Most of the internal journeys through the Union and both Rhodesias are to be by air. Four official "test matches" against South Africa are planned as well as fixtures against all the South African provinces and against both Northern and Southern Rhodesia. It is understood that the South African Badminton Union is hopeful that a young team will be sent. So far, of course, the invitation has not been considered by the B.A. of England, but it can be anticipated that it is likely to be accepted if the players are available.

It will be recalled that a previous English team visited the Union in 1948, and that a Danish international team went out in 1951.

If the invitation can be accepted it seems that it will provide a great experience in more directions than one for England's rising players who are now already almost up to the best post-war standard in this country.

### A. D. Jordan is the Youngest

A. D. Jordan, selected as a member of the England team to oppose both Scotland and Denmark in the Thomas Cup competition is the youngest player anywhere in the world to be chosen to represent his country in the International Badminton Championship. Whether Jordan plays or Championship. Whether Jordan plays or not (and he did not do so against Scotland) he is definitely listed by the International Badminton Federation as an England Thomas Cup player. He would not be the first man nominated for a team and not be called upon. In the 1948-49 contest there were two such players. B. D. Shroff was nominated for India and Conny Jepsen for Sweden. So far this season this small list has been increased by Sagna Hoontragoon of Thailand, John Nygaard of Denmark, and two Australians. The list is sure to grow, and the reason is quite simple. Ten days before each tie a nation has to nominate six players from whom its playing composi-tion must later be chosen. With only three singles players and two doubles pairs required, it is thus not always necessary to call upon all the six nominees. It is, however, advisable, to have that number available in case of injuries cropping

Though the youngest England Thomas Cup player, Jordan is not, all the same, the youngest English international if all international matches are reckoned. This honour belongs to John Shaw who was three months younger than Jordan when he played against Sweden in March, 1950.

# Scotland Beats Ireland, 6-3

Caledonians Register their First Win on Irish Soil—J. A. Russell Proves his Singles Superiority amongst British Isles Players—A Fine Victory for R. S. Hodge and W. A. Robinson

Scotland defeated Ireland, 6-3, in Belfast on 29th February, thus recording her second win against us since the war. Irish supporters expected a home win despite the known improvement in the Scottish side. The Scots, however, pressed home an early psychological advantage in J. A. Russell's victory over F. W. Peard to win the day most decisively. The matches were played on one court and the events are dealt with in order of play.

In the top singles Russell maintained the form which had already given him victories over K. R. Greasley and N. B. Radford this season. He maintained a fine length, keeping Peard away from the net, and smashed decisively. He was obviously "match-tight," whereas Peard, who had not played in a tournament for almost eight weeks, was not. It was two years since Peard had lost to a player from the home countries.

A. J. McIntyre showed tremendous power in beating J. P. Doyle, 15-7, 15-2. The Irishman had won in a previous encounter this season but on this occasion McIntyre smashed right through his defence.

Miss Good and Miss Lawless might have won against Mrs. Horner and Mrs. Robertson. As it was, Mrs. Horner had them continually in difficulties with well played drops to the middle of the net. For the last couple of seasons the Irish teams have been very unfortunate in that no regular pairing of ladies seems to be able to make the team.

Ireland went into the men's doubles three matches down and received her crowning blow in the defeat of Peard and FitzGibbon who have probably never before lost to a Scottish pair. R. S. Hodge and W. A. Robinson played extremely well, blending stonewall defence with ability to counter-attack rapidly. Robinson, particularly, was very aggressive in the forecourt. The Irish pair won the first game 17-15, lost the second to 10 and trailed 4-14 in the third following a series of errors by Peard. At this stage despera-tion regained something of their greatness for them and, with the Scots becoming increasingly tentative, they survived at least half-a-dozen match points to reach 12-14. An amazingly good but extremely lucky stroke by Hodge brought the Scots in to serve at this stage and, at last, to gain the game. The Scottish pair deserved its victory on the run of the play.

Four-love down, Green and Majury staved off defeat a little while longer by defeating J. C. Mackay and Russell. They trailed behind during most of the third game and then levelled at 13 all, one hand down. The Scots refused to set but failed to score on gaining the service, and the Irishmen got home on their next effort. This was a good and hard fought match with plenty of attack being met by sound defence.

J. K. D. Lacey and Doyle defeated McIntyre and D. Ross to make the score The Scotsmen never covered one another off at the net and were always being attacked. Ross was well below the level of the rest of the Scottish men.

A decision was reached when the second mixed went to Scotland in the persons of Hodge and Mrs. Armstrong who beat FitzGibbon and Miss Good 15-13, 11-15, 15-12. All four players played well up to form but the Irish pair must incur severe criticism for failing to push home a lead of 8-2 (subsequently 11-8) in the third game when Hodge was obviously very tired; indeed on one occasion he had to stop to recover from an attack of cramp.

Green and Mrs. Potter were defeated decisively by Robinson and Mrs. Horner in the top mixed. Robinson's hard hitting. wristy game always had Green stretching and although the latter got himself out of much difficulty by his strong defence he missed some easy chances of pressing home winners.

Lacey became the only Irish player to win two matches when he and Miss Law-less beat Mackay and Mrs. Robertson. Mrs. Robertson was definitely weaker than the other Scottish ladies.

### It had been Postponed

The international fixture between Ireland and Scotland, originally arranged for 14th February, at Belfast, was postponed owing to the death of H.M. King George VI. As originally selected, the Irish team showed one change from that defeated by England a month earlier. Mrs. D. Potter came back to the exclusion of Mrs. B. I. Donaldson. The fixture was hastily re-arranged to take place on 29th February, and the team to represent Ireland was as selected for the earlier date.

It was most unfortunate that the newlyestablished junior international against the Scots had also to be cancelled. This should have been held at Londonderry on 13th February between teams of four boys and two girls. The B.U. of Ireland, who suggested this contest, originally had

in mind an age limit of 23, but the Scottish B.U. asked for the lower limit of 21 which was evenually agreed upon.

It was intended that both teams, after playing their matches, should have travelled back to Belfast to take part in the Irish championships, a valuable experience for them.

### The Irish Championships

Scheduled to be held over the week-end of 15th February, the Irish Open Championships became restricted to a one-day meeting owing to the funeral of H.M. the King. In consequence thereof, and of the postponement of the Ireland v. Scotland international fixture, there were no Scotsmen on hand at Belfast when the tournament was played off. Also, several English visitors who had entered were eventually absentees.

E. B. Choong retained his singles cup after another one of his almost weekly battles with H. A. Heah. The latter tired, however, rather visibly towards the middle of the second game, and Choong got home a comfortable winner. The Choong brothers added the Irish doubles title to their All-England honours. In the final they were opposed to the strange-looking combination of J. J. FitzGibbon and Heah. FitzGibbon's usual partner, F. W. Peard, was an absentee.

Miss Jean Lawless added the Irish Open title to her Irish Close success of last November, and she and Miss Barbara Good had little trouble in winning the ladies' doubles. In the mixed, Heah and Mrs. Saunders resumed where they had left off a month before at the Scottish Championships.

# The Thomas Cup Progresses

In a Few Days' Time only Three Challengers will Remain

### Denmark Beat Sweden, 6-3

In the outstanding second round European Zone tie, Denmark beat Sweden by six matches to three at Copenhagen on 16th and 17th February. Principal feature of the play was the splendid performance of Nils Jonson who upset both Poul Holm and Jorn Skaarup in singles. Sweden's other success was also in the singles when Knut Malmgren won the third string match against the newcomer, Jorgen Hammergaard Hansen.

Play occurred at the Idraetshuset before what was, however, a most disappointingly small concourse of spectators, 250 being the most present on either day.

Sweden drew first blood when Jonson, in the biggest upset of the present competition, defeated Holm, the reigning Danish champion. Holm led in the first game, 11-6, but thereafter there was only one player in it as the little Swede captured the game to 13 and ran away to a 13-0 lead in the second! Denmark won the remaining three first day matches without loss of a game.

On the second day, Jonson again accomplished a fine piece of giant-killing when he saved a match-point against Skaarup and then won the third game with some-

thing to spare. Though Inge Blomberg then failed against Holm, Malmgren brought the score to 3-4 by his singles success. After that, Sweden was within one point of making things four all when Jonson and Stellan Mohlin had a match point against Ib Olesen and John Nygaard, but they failed to sustain their lead. Denmark also won the last match.

In the past Sweden's strength has usually lain in the doubles, and it was surprising that their two pairs could win only one game in the four doubles matches.

Thus, Eastern players of both these large countries will be able to play in the Thomas Cup and in their own national championships on the same trip to the west.



### Close Men's Matches

The men's doubles provided some very good matches and the final, in which H. A. Heah and L. T. Lee beat the holders was very exciting; the umpire had great difficulty in maintaining an impassive face as the tension mounted. In earlier rounds one noticed a victory by K. E. Foster and J. Paul over L. G. Coffin and D. Harvey, and the fact that P. V. Willford and K. W. Hunter took a game from A. B. Renton and R. C. F. Nichols. The latter pair raised hopes of a British win when they took a game from E. B. Choong and S. H. Lim, but stamina beat them in the end, not, however, before the spectators had been treated to a fine exhibition and had all wondered what might have been had our best players of former years been at their peak at the same time as the best Malayans.

The ladies' doubles somehow seemed to be played on a softer note, and Mrs. K. M. Henderson and Mrs. S. Wyatt did not really have many anxious moments before they won the cups outright, though they did lose a game to the young pair, Miss I. Cooley and Miss White. In the final Miss D. B. Grace and Mrs. M. Barnett played well without ever looking as if they could quite win.

The mixed doubles had such a large entry that it would be impossible to detail entry that it would be impossible to detail the play in the space available, but it should be noted that C. R. Denton and Miss Grace, H. I. Palmer and Miss White, and K. E. Foster and Miss Stone all played well. My ideas were all wrong: Heah and Mrs. ideas were all wrong; Heah and Mrs. Henderson did not seem to combine as well as one would have thought and, with Miss Cooley playing a very good net game and Choong bringing off his best shots in his last match, the latter won comfortably.

No players made a "clean sweep" in the tournament, although Choong and Mrs. Henderson each won two titles. Once again the latter was the outstanding lady player and one wonders why she never seems to catch the eye of the English

The handicap committee performed very well with the large entry they had to judge and, although the eventual winners in each event seemed to play better than their handicaps, they all lost games on the way to victory and must have been very tired people indeed by the time they claimed their well deserved prizes.

### A Plea for Umpires

On the theory that the standard of umpiring should be improved, the organisers of this tournament always try to have every match umpired, but the response from players is not all that it should be. It is realised that some people are shy about umpiring, but a little goodwill on both sides can help over the difficult patches, and, if every player did his or her share, there would not be so much criticism of others. It is usually a case of flogging the willing horse for this job, and it is hoped that players will try to remember the enormous amount of work put in by others for their enjoyment and will endeavour to increase the pleasure of themselves and others by taking a share of umpiring so that the standard throughout the country can be raised.

It would be invidious to mention names, but it is with the greatest possible pleasure that one pays a public tribute to those people who work so hard to make a tournament a success, often with very little thanks.

# Middlesex's 1000 Entries

Large Junior Participation is Encouraging as Play is Split between Hampstead and Cazenove Courts

Middlesex championships and Hampstead tournament were held during the week of 2nd—9th February, open events being played at the Orion Hall, Stamford Hill, and the junior championships, restricted and handicap events at the Hampstead Baths.

When describing the numerical strength of this tournament, each succeeding year calls for greater superlatives, and this year proved no exception, over 1,000 entries being received for the various events. Without going into lengthy details, it is sufficient to say that in one handicap event the list of entries had to be closed a fortnight before the official closing date, and many entries had to be refused.

As a result of the new date, a far more representative entry was received for the championship events than last year. With the exception of one event, all titles changed hands, Miss I. Cooley retaining her singles title without undue difficulty. In partnership with Eddy Choong she also won the mixed doubles. Interest in this event centred on the very fine achievement of J. A. Broadhurst and Mrs. A. M. Horner, who defeated E. L. Choong and Miss J. White in two games in an early round. Apart from messing up the seeding, it was very gratifying to Middlesex supporters to see a "home product" final which, on paper, should have been almost entirely an all-Choong affair. A very fine semi-final in this event was seen when Eddy Choong and Miss I. Cooley beat H. A. Heah and Mrs. C. M. Robin-It is thought that the almost Arctic conditions prevailing in the Orion Hall at the time had an adverse effect on Heah.

# Activities in Scandinavia

(We acknowledge our indebtedness to our two Scandinavian contemporaries, "Svensk Badminton Sport," of Malmo, and "Badminton," of Copenhagen, for permission to quote the results of the undermentioned important events which have recently featured the game in Sweden and Denmark).

### Denmark's Twelfth Victory Over Sweden

Denmark scored her twelfth successive victory over the Swedish international team when the sides met at Nykobing on the Island of Falster in the Baltic on Sunday, 3rd February. The result was a bit of a landslide, as the visitors did not win a single game. The Swedish team had an unfamiliar look about it with Nils Jonson, Stellan Mohlin and Inge Blomberg all being absent, these three all being current Swedish national title-holders. The fixture was staged only a fortnight before the two countries were due to meet in a Thomas Cup tie, and it seems possible that the northerners may have kept back some of their leaders in view thereof. Thus, Swedish international colours were awarded to two new representatives. They were Leif Ekedahl and Frk Astrid Lofgren who were the first players from Gothenburg to be so honoured. The latter's twin sister, Tora, who was reserve, is the present Swedish ladies' singles champion, and the other reserve, Bertil Glans, also comes from the west coast, his home being at Halmstad. It is evident, therefore, that the hitherto immune supremacy of Malmo and Stockholm players in Sweden is being seriously threatened, an excellent sign.

A Busy Time for Sweden's Players

The leading players in Sweden look like having time for little else but Badminton in the next few weeks. On 17th March, Sweden will meet Ireland in Dublin, the first visit of the Scandinavian team to the Green Isle, though not the first clash of the two countries. They met in a friendly men's engagement at Malmo three seasons ago when the Swedes only lost one of the nine matches played on Thomas Cup lines. This season's fixtures will include ladies' and mixed events

From Dublin the Swedes will come to London to take in the All-England championships, but they must be back in their own country for their own national championships which commence on the day following the completion of the All-England tournament. This meeting, scheduled for three days, will be held at the west coast town of Falkenberg, which is to be honoured with the meeting for the first time. It will be the 16th Swedish

championship tournament. On 3rd April, Sweden meets England at Malmo. The teams here will also, for the first time, comprise both men and ladies. Two days later, there will no doubt be many Swedish players taking part in the Danish open championships at Copenhagen, and as soon as that is over Sweden will be entertaining the Scottish inter-national team at Gothenburg for the first fixture ever played between those two countries. When all that is accomplished, no doubt Nils Jonson and company will be glad of the Easter holiday interregnum.

### Frk Agnete Friis is Lady Champion of Copenhagen

An upset of the first magnitude occurred in the annual championships of Copenhagen at the end of January when Frk Agnete Friis won the ladies' singles after a victory over Fru Aase Winther (nee Svendsen), after a very close struggle. An extraordinary fact about this event was that these two were the only entrants! Indeed, none of the players who had been on the South African tour took part in the tournament at all, with the exception of Frk Aase Jacobsen, who restricted her participation to the mixed event. Skaarup had no trouble in winning the men's singles, and similarly the men's doubles was comfortably won by John Nygaard and Ib Olesen, generally regarded as Denmark's leading pair at the moment. ### Some Surprises at Gothenburg

Several very surprising results featured the seventh annual international tournament promoted by the Orgryte Club in Gothenburg on 12th and 13th January. 

In each case all five ladies' matches have been won. Warwickshire will find, however, that the ladies' opposition in London will be rather greater than she has so far encountered, and so she will not be able to enjoy this delightful start and advantage.

In the north Cheshire continues to carry all before her. She, too. has improved on her last season's results in her zone, and the Mersevsiders ought certainly to eliminate Durham from any further active interest in the competition. The improvement of A. D. Jordan and the greater reliability of Scotland's new cap, W. A. Robinson, must be looked upon as strengthening. An odd feature of the Cheshire v. Middlesex clash, if it comes off, is going to be the top men's singles. It is likely to be fought out between two Scotlish internationals!

In Division II there are bound to be new finalists in the south. Neither Glouc-estershire nor Berks, Bucks and Oxon have ever contested a final tie before. It is rather difficult to prophecy which of these will survive from their own clash. J. H. Lawton Smith and C. Denton form a power of strength to the triumvirate, but the westerners' strength is not so well known. larity year by year? Hertfordshire did so a season ago, and she went down to Berks, Bucks and Oxon a few months ago. In any event, the Division II outcome must remain very problematical.

The challenge ties come next in order of interest and their result is of great importance to the participants therein. There will be seven such ties in all, though one has already been played off. This saw Northumberland retain her Division I status for another year. She has considerable advantages over Cumberland in every respect, and the Northumbrian 13-2 victory was hardly a surprise.

The two other clashes between the avoiders of relegation and the seekers after promotion to the top circle are between Leicestershire and Northamptonshire, and Essex and the winners of the Gloucestershire-Berks, Bucks and Oxon tie. The first named climbed up at this stage a year ago; Northamptonshire started when the present system was adopted four years ago as berth-holders of Division I society, but were ejected by Derbyshire at the first opportunity. # Did You Know That . . .

Answers and Comments (See Page 131).

1. Jesper Bie, the reigning Danish junior champion, reached the final of the men's singles in 1938 after beating two English internationals and the Danish champion, Tage Madsen, on the way. He was beaten by R. C. F. Nichols, 15-4, 15-5.

2. It was in 1901 that the present known court was adopted. Prior to that date, the court had been of the hour-glass shape, four feet narrower at the net than at the baselines. It was a fault if the shuttle went round the net posts even though it might fall within the court beyond. To assist in determining whether it actually passed over the net, and not round it, the net posts were required to be extended a further seven feet above the top of the net.

3. Before the International Badminton Federation was founded, clubs from anywhere could affiliate to the Badminton Association, as it was then known. The first from outside the British Isles to do so was the Homburg Badminton Club in 1902. Baron von Maltzahn was the honorary secretary of the club formed at this German spa.

4. The four men who played for Kent in 1928-29 all played during the same season in international matches as follows:—J. F. Devlin for Ireland, P. D. Macfarlane for England, W. B. Jones for Wales, and W. J. A. Bonar for Scotland.

5. The trophy is on its way back from England after having been on view in London at the National Sporting Trophies Exhibition. It will be defended in Singapore which is not part of the Federation of Malaya. Singapore is a Crown Colony, but by recognition of the International Badminton Federation some years ago, Singapore is regarded as part of Malaya for Badminton purposes.

6. The four non-international All-England championship winners since 1947 are Frk Marie Ussing (Denmark), Mrs. Clinton Stephens (U.S.A.) and E. L. and E. B. Choong of Malaya. The four winners between the wars were Judge A. F. Engelbach, Mrs. A. D. Stocks and Miss E. G. Peterson of England and Mrs. W. R. Walton of Canada. Of these, Judge Engelbach was invited to play for his country but was unable to accept the honour owing to the calls of his profession.

7. Up to a few years before the first war there were clauses in the Laws of Badminton to provide for more than two players a side, this being a relic of the infancy days of the game. A curious feature of them was that if the receiver was unable to reach a high service sent to him, the shuttle could be returned by the player who was permanently stationed at the back of the court. As far as is known, no open tournament events for three or more players a side took place in the British Isles, but right up to and including 1938 the Punjab Championships in India contained both "Gent's Jacside" and

1938 the Punjab Championships in India contained both "Gent's 3-a-side" and "Mixed 3-a-side" events. The last winners of these old-fashioned matches were Hidayat, Harnarain and Zahur in the former, and Kartar, Miss S. Kaul and Miss Duke in the latter.

8. R. M. White was the player who

failed to serve in an international match which he and his partner won. It was on 9th January, 1933, when England played Denmark for the first time. Mrs. Uber served thirty times successively when she and White defeated Aksel Hansen and

Frk Bodil Clausen, 15-0, 15-0.

9. Cheshire has W. E. Smith, A. D. Jordan, Mrs. L. R. Ludlam and Mrs. G. F. Saunders, all of whom possess England international colours, and W. A. Robinson who played for Scotland this season.

10. The London League was formed in 1908-09, and had an uninterrupted existence, except for 1914 to 1920, until 1939. It was revived this season. When it was formed there were no inter-club competitions run by counties as exist nowadays.

### A Malayan Project

To follow immediately upon the Thomas Cup Challenge Tie, the Selangor Badminton Association is organising an international invitation tournament at Kuala Lumpur, the capital of the Federation of Malaya, to which all overseas Thomas Cup players then in Malaya for the International Championship ties will be invited. This should be an extremely interesting meeting.

New Names on the Honour Rolls

During the past month several new names were added to the lists of England international players and winners of national championship events. Congratulations are due to W. E. Smith of Cheshire and Miss Betty Grace of Essex on the award of international colours against Scotland, and to A. D. Jordan (also of Cheshire) on his nomination as a member of England's Thomas Cup team. He is the youngest Thomas Cup representative be chosen for any country. ever to National Championship honours went for the first time to Miss Esme Andrews of Middlesex and Mrs. G. F. Saunders of Cheshire when they won events in the Scottish Championships. What with W. A. Robinson also gaining Scottish international selection, Cheshire players have been very much in the public eye recently. Apart from the four just mentioned, Cheshire also boast the possession of Mrs. R. Ludlam who is also playing, and playing very well indeed, for England. No other county can claim five internationals in its county team.

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# The Danish National Championships

The 22nd annual Danish National Championships were played off at Copenhagen from 23rd to 26th February. The Kobenhavn B.K. was the scene of the preliminary matches, and the Idraetshuset staged the final rounds of all five events.

The principal feature of the meeting was the closeness of most of the matches, even right from the start, and this is regarded as a fine omen for Danish play of the future. Indeed, we are told that for general standard of excellence the play has never been higher than it was this year.

There were two great surprises, and they centred round Fru Jytte Kjems, who, quite unseeded, nevertheless won the doubles with her old partner and former All-England champion, Frk Marie Ussing, and played a mixed game of such quality as has not been seen in recent years in Copenhagen. In retaining his singles title, Poul Holm performed well up to the highest of his inspired moments. Apart from the final, he lost but one game, and that in the first round to a junior, Bent Lillelund.

Features of the ladies' singles were the unfortunate withdrawal owing to illness of the holder, Fru Kirsten Lossmann, the regaining of the honour of champion by Fru Tonny Ahm, and the game against her which Fru Inger Kjaergaard of Jutland won in the second round.

In winning the men's and mixed doubles, Holm completed his hat-trick. Curiously, for one so prominent in Denmark, he had never won the men's doubles before. An upset was the success of Ole Jensen and Fru Gitte Schultz Pedersen in beating Jorn Skaarup and Frk Aase Jacobsen, and the defeat, at 18-15 in the third game, of the Lossmanns, who were the holders, by Mogens Kolle and Frk Ellen Jorgensen.

### About Fru Jytte Kiems

The remarkable success of Fru Jytte Kjems in winning the Danish national doubles championship with Frk Marie Ussing must focus attention on a name quite unknown outside her own country. Fru Kjems is the former Frk Jytte Thayssen who was right at the top in Danish Badminton throughout the war years. After being Danish junior champion in 1940-41, Frk Thayssen won, within the next four seasons, no fewer than four ladies' doubles and four mixed doubles championships of her country, the first of each when she was still a junior. She and Frk Ussing have played together since their schooldays and their success last month was actually their third in partnership in the Danish national event. Fru Kjems had been quite out of the game for the past five years, and the extent of surprise occasioned by her success can be gauged by her not having been seeded in any event of the Danish Championships at all. We are given to understand, too, that her net play in the mixed was of a quality never previously surpassed in Denmark.

As Frk Thayssen, Fru Kjems represented Denmark in international matches against Sweden three times during the war years. She has also featured prominently in Lawn Tennis circles in her country; she was Danish junior champion in 1941, and no doubt inherited much of her games skill from her father, Axel Thayssen, who was six times men's doubles champion of Denmark at the summer game between 1909 and 1917 and who was a member of Denmark's first international tennis team in 1920. He helped his country to win the Nordic Cup from Sweden, Norway and Finland in that competition's inaugural vear.

### Congratulations to Alderman P. F. Friend-James

We congratulate the former Sussex County player, P. F. Friend-James, who was unanimously elected as an alderman Brighton Town Council last month. Ald. Friend-James was Mayor of Brighton from November, 1947, to May, 1949, and he is also Chief Special Constable of the borough. In his playing days, Ald. Friend-James was also honorary secretary of the Sussex County Badminton Association for three years. In this office he was the immediate predecessor of Mr. F. C. Sharp, who held the Sussex reins for 21 years before retiring two or three years ago. Ald. Friend-James has been a vice-president of the Sussex County B.A. for over twenty years now.

### Essex Secretary to be Mayor of Ilford

At its meeting on 22nd January the Ilford Council unanimously elected Councillor H. D. Cowan to be the next Mayor of Ilford. He will take office next May. and it is anticipated that he will be raised to the Aldermanic Bench this month.

Mr. Cowan has been on the Ilford Council since 1945, and has during the past six years acted in a truly remarkable number of capacities in the interests of his borough. Ilford's Mayor-elect is of course the present honorary secretary of the Essex County Badminton Association, an office in which he has worked with tremendous enthusiasm since the war. Before 1939 he was hon. league secretary of the Essex County B.A. Mr. Cowan is also a member of the committee of the B.A. of England.

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
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
