#### BADMINTON FINDS ITS FEET

By ROBERT D. FORSTER

THE 1935-36 season in the North American badminton field which we review in the pages which follow is so replete with notable occurrences in the comparatively short history of the game, that to chronicle the headlining achievement of the season is a difficult problem indeed.

It is with infinite satisfaction that we publish the Badminton Guide this year. In collecting data from so many far flung sources we are fully convinced of one thing, that being that badminton has found its feet, and is a "growing boy" of no small proportions. That fact is impressed upon our minds time and again as we put these pages together, for in glancing back at its predecessors they seem insignificant in comparison, and well substantiate the assertion that badminton is sweeping a greater part of this continent with tremendous rapidity.

We have said in the past that badminton is showing definite progress, and the game is moving ahead in quality as well as in quantity. We can only repeat it again, and without exaggeration, for the facts are much apparent.

While Canada continues to expand its badminton field, it is to the United States this year that we can gaze at with amazement as the game gains a hold with rapid strides. A bare three years ago it seemed that a development such has been effected was still a long way off.

An American Badminton Association seemed a probability, but hardly of the magnitude of the one which has come into being. Badminton has become possessed of a pair of very sturdy legs as it progresses in the United States. It has become established along sound principles, its foundations well conceived, and its guiding figures a group of men who have not pushed their plans too rapidly, but analysed the whole situation thoroughly.

As another season gets underway this association will be in a position to present a well defined program, building for the future, and maintaining a proper atmosphere in the game. A National championship tournament seems certain of being held during the 1936-37 season, and international fixtures, involving Canadian and American players, seem likely to become more prevalent across the continent.

These past few years have wrought great developments in the United States. Just what will happen during the next few years is difficult to visualize, but the manner in which young players are being developed fully illustrates that many a potential champion is about ready to hurl his challenge.

To Donald E. Wilbur, and his associates, who may be termed "the fathers of badminton" in the United States, will be tendered every good wish as they launch their American Badminton Association this year. May they be accorded co-operation to the fullest in their endeavor to give the game a "lift."

Detail as to the personnel of the American Badminton Association is tendered elsewhere in this handbook, and to consider such associations as the Badminton Association of New England, the California State, the Midwest, the Washington State, the Michigan State, the Ohio State, the Tri-State, the Western New York, the Metropolitan, and Philadelphia Badminton Associations, is but to appreciate somewhat vaguely the tremendous scope of the parent group recently formed.

The evidences of goodwill which have been frequently illustrated between Canadian and American players and officials augurs well for the future in the game of badminton, as the trend towards

international play becomes well emphasized.

W. Lindsay Malcolm, of Kingston, Ontario, steps out of office with the sublime satisfaction of knowing that his three year term as President of the Canadian Badminton Association was a job well done. During that period he has witnessed the mushroom growth of the game in many points in the Dominion, and saw his association co-ordinate the governing bodies more fully in the various provinces.

In vacting the president's chair he has yielded office to a man who has done much for the uplift of the game in the Dominion, and at the same time performed a neighborly act by assisting in the early formation of a parent group to the South of the border.

William N. Keenan, of Ottawa, certainly needs no introduction as he accepts the presidency of the C.B.A., having attended tournaments in many sections while secretary of that body, and also being actively engaged as a player also.

Annual reports of the association during the term in which Lindsay Malcolm served as President, and William Keenan its Honorary Secretary, vouch for the progressive yet solid manner in which these officials, and their associates, guided the association through a period that was definitely progressive.

In the pages which follow will be found badminton information gathered from far and wide. Its assembly has been a difficult task, and will continue to be so as the game experiences further

expansion.

The thanks of the editor are tendered to those officials and players whose assistance made this collection of tournament data possible. The request is made herewith that badminton authorities co-operate in making this Guide a publication of even further completeness, by forwarding their tournament information at an early date.

#### CANADIAN BADMINTON ASSOCIATION

A T the annual meeting of the Canadian Badminton Association, held at Winnipeg the first week of March, during the playing of the Canadian championships at the Winnipeg Winter Club, William N. Keenan of Ottawa was elected to the presidency, succeeding Professor W. Lindsay Malcolm of Kingston, who had held that office for three years.

#### PRESIDENT ELECT

William N. Keenan, of Ottawa, who has succeeded Professor W. Lindsay Malcolm, of Kingston, Ont., as president of the Canadian Badminton Association. He had previously served as Honorary Secretary-Treasurer of that organization. That vacated position was filled by J. Leslie John-ston of Winnipeg, the new president of the Manitoba Badminton Association, and former honorary secretary of that body.



C. Hugo Rayment of Victoria, B.C., was named to the vice-presidency, succeeding H. R. Partington of Vancouver, who had held many high posts in Canadian badminton.

During the holding of the meeting, at which favorable progress was reported throughout the Dominion, the venue for next year's tournament was decided upon, Vancouver being granted the championships.

#### CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

THAT hackneyed expression of sport, "They never come back," as applied to former champions striving to again regain a place in the sun, is quite frequently belied. It was thoroughly disproved in the Canadian championships at the Winnipeg Winter Club in March, as Doug Grant restored himself to a pinnacle in the sport which was his two years ago. In winning the men's singles championship of Canada for the third occasion, the sturdy Winnipegger, who has also used Kingston and Halifax as his address, became the first player to gain that honor on three occasions. In doing so he crossed up many who expected that he did not have sufficient stamina to do the trick, after having been placed on the sidelines the previous year through an attack of pneumonia, and other complications.

So, while other players were brilliant in their efforts in this greatest of all Canadian tournaments, Grant somewhat overshadowed them through the perfection of his game, and his great determination in fighting a tough draw to regain his lost laurels.

It looked like the Grant of old who survived that singles draw, although it was a Grant a trifle more cautious in his play, and more inclined to save his physical resources than the boy of two years back who put everything he had into his singles game. The knowledge that he must not sap his stamina too much was reflected in his play, and he used a lot of headwork to carry him through to another triumph.

The triumphant march of Grant in his resolute trip to another title was somewhat paralleled by the court-work of Mrs. W. R. Walton, of Toronto. She tasted victory in the same round she met defeat a year ago, by turning the tables on the 1935 holder, and ridding Margret Taylor, of Kelowna, B.C., of her National singles title.

Every year the standard of play in the Canadian championships seems to undergo noticeable improvement. For the 1936 classic, it can be said without exaggeration that it was the best yet. Not only were the arrangements for play and also the entertainment of the players splendidly carried out, but the class of the entries was particularly outstanding.

Winnipeg was in the right spot to permit East to meet West, with the result that the majority of the first flight players in the Dominion had the opportunity to attend. It was fitting, therefore, in keeping with such a representative entry, that the titles should be well distributed, there being no signs of monopoly, with East, West and Mid-West all taking a hand in the prize distribution.

The Capital had its full measure of success, as two Ottawa girls, Ruth and Margaret Robertson, defended their women's doubles title. They had the distinction of being the only champions to repeat.

That well experienced veteran of many a National tournament, Jack Underhill, of Vancouver, added another title, and with a new partner, as he teamed Eric Leney, of Duncan, B.C., to the men's doubles championship.

Doug Grant did the honors for Winnipeg, when he took the men's singles, and with Jimmy Forsyth figured in the doubles final, unsuccessfully, as well. Mrs. W. R. Walton brought the women's singles title to Toronto. Fully deserving of some share of the spoils, Mrs. Anna Kier Patrick and Dick Birch, of Vancouver, made an impressive showing as they won the mixed doubles, to conclude a brilliant tournament. Winnipeggers tasted further success when Dr. C. O. Wood and C. E. Allen won the veteran's doubles, beating Frank McLorg and S. Scrutton, Saskatoon, 15-10, 15-2.

#### MIXED DOUBLES RE-TURNS TO THE PACIFIC

With such a wide range of strong talent in the draw, many good matches featured the early rounds. In the men's singles Doug Grant removed a strong obstacle in the person of Joe Zaharko in the third round, 15-9, 15-7, the latter being a player capable of giving all-comers plenty of opposition. In the same round Gord Reynolds, Quebec champion, was carried to an extra game in a long duel with Jack Blanchfield, Winnipeg, while Jack Nash gave a good account of himself as he prolonged his match with Jack Underhill an extra game. Two strong Winnipeggers fell away in this round, when Charlie Jones went down before Jack Storey, Toronto, 15-8, 15-6, while Jimmy Forsyth went out to Jack Sibbald, 15-12, 15-12. Bev. Mitchell, indifferent in other singles events this year, showed what a hardened campaigner he is when he put out the second best player from the West coast, Eric Leney, in three games, 8-15, 15-10, 15-6.

The defending champion, Roddy Phelan, entered the semi-final bracket at the expense of Gordon Reynolds, straight games, in a round literally loaded with fireworks. Underhill's fine defensive make-up was strong enough to prolong the match with Grant to 8-15, 15-5, 15-11 scores. Jack Sibbald was tossing a mild sensation at the Winter Club when he made the most of his smashing game to snuff out Bev. Mitchell, 18-17, 15-4.

It was the remaining match of the quarters, youthful Jack Storey, from Toronto, and Dick Birch, from Vancouver, that produced the main sensation, and rated with the best in the tournament. Birch won by 11-15, 17-14, 18-14, and the match was every bit as close as the score might indicate. In fact Birch was just about

ready to be counted out, but the Vancouver boy hung on by a thread, receiving a major break when on the verge of being eliminated. Storey was leading at one time, 15-11, and holding 14-9 in the second, with match bird on his racket. The winning stroke was in the air when Storey applied a finely executed drop shot. The bird barely perched on the top of the net, momentarily wavered each way, and then fell back into Storey's court. If it had gone the other way it would have been elimination for Birch, who thereupon gained service, and with a gritty display battled from behind, to take that game and square the match, and eventually win the third.

Grant proved too strong a finisher for Roddy Phelan in the semi-final, winning in three sets, although the latter was hardly rated at his best, with indisposition weakening him in the final session. In the other bracket Birch battled to the final, allowing Sibbald but seven points en route, as he dominated the play completely.

Many veterans present at Winnipeg were willing to admit that the Grant-Birch final was the best that has yet been witnessed. It is a debatable question, but there can be no discounting the perfection of the play, as Grant triumphed, 15-6, 9-15, 15-9. Grant's ability to keep the shuttle in play, administer a deceiving change of pace, and keep his errors to a minimum, was a big factor in winning over the hard-hitting Birch, whose deadly smashing finally lost its touch under the steady pressure that Grant maintained all the way. Some of Grant's "gets" were marvellous, as he handled Birch's famed speed in expert fashion.

As in the men's event, the ladies' singles left much room for speculation, and interesting matches featured all the way. Although suffering defeat in the semi-finals, Mrs. Gordon Pirt was one of the outstanding players in the event. The petite Winnipegger in the opening round put out a strong player in the person of Betty Snell, Ottawa, in three games. She followed up with a win over Mrs. Boyd, Winnipeg, and then caused the surprise of the tournament by beating a former champion, Ruth Robertson, Ottawa, 14-13, 11-4. Margaret Taylor put a stop to her winning streak by beating the Winnipegger in the semi-finals, 11-6, 11-0.

Miss Taylor, defending champion, ran into some trouble with Peggy Aiken, Edmonton. Mrs. Anna Kier Patrick, another favorite, likewise encountered trouble with another Prairie star when Barbara Mitchell extended her in an early round. Mrs. Harley Hughes, Winnipeg, was carried the full limit by Isobel Bryson, before she went down, while Elizabeth Kennedy had her troubles in the same before disposing of Doreen Clapperton, Calgary. Vess O'Shea, of Vancouver, gave Mrs. W. R. Walton a good argument before she went out in the sixteens.

Feature of the quarters was the upset of Ruth Robertson by Mrs. Pirt, while Mrs. Patrick was beating Elizabeth Kennedy, 11-8, 11-2; Mrs. Walton was being carried to 5-11, 11-3, 11-1 scores by Margaret Robertson, and Margaret Taylor was beating Mrs. Hughes, 11-6, 11-0.

While Margaret Taylor was beating Mrs. Pirt, 11-6, 11-0 in the semi-finals, Mrs. W. R. Walton and Mrs. Patrick were going through one of the most interesting matches of the tournament in the other bracket, the former winning in straight games, 11-7, 11-8.

It looked like a runaway victory for Margaret Taylor during the early moments of the final, as she again defended against Mrs. Walton. She ran up a 7-0 lead, picked up during five services as she in the meantime held Mrs. Walton scoreless. Rallies were of short duration, and the match lacked spectacular qualities. From there Mrs. Walton began to put her stroking in order, her attack being concentrated on Margaret's backhand corner, tactics which paid ample dividends, in the form of defensive replies, with Mrs. Walton moving to the net to smash for placements. Gradually

Mrs. Walton worked up to 6-7, and later tied the score at 9-9, as the best badminton of the match was provided. Mrs. Walton took five points in a row from there, her smash being instrumental in her success as she won the opener, 14-9.

The finalists were never more than one point separated as they battled to 9-9 in the second game. With the game set at five, Mrs. Walton went on to lead, 2-1, but Miss Taylor caught her, and then moved on to 4-2. She let a clear drop in at this point, to give Mrs. Walton service, and the latter made the most of it to again tie the score at 4-4, services alternating before Mrs. Walton gained the title-winning point.

Stirring badminton was furnished from start to finish in the men's doubles, with Jack Underhill and Eric Leney ultimately

carrying the title back to the Pacific Coast, after beating Doug Grant and Jimmy Forsyth, Winnipeg, in the final, 15-9, 18-17.

The Roberston sisters, Ruth and Margaret, looked considerably the best as they retained their women's doubles, beating another Ottawa team, Betty Snell and Isobel Byrson, 15-10, 15-11 in a lively final.

Likewise, Mrs. Anna Kier Patrick and Dick Birch, unsuccessful in their singles bids, were the class of the mixed doubles, as they teamed admirably to win that event, beating Ruth Roberston and Bev. Mitchell in the final round, 15-12, 15-12.






## ONTARIO CHAMPIONSHIPS

A FTER many months of intensive preparation, the American Badminton Association, a long-felt necessity in the United States, was finally established, and officials installed in mid-August of this year.

Donald E. Wilbur, of Boston, actively engaged in setting organized badminton on its feet in the United States, who has been installed as the first president of the American Badminton Association.



The result is that Donald E. Wilbur, of Boston, is the first president of the Association, with William H. Ferguson, of Seattle, Washington, and Hamilton Walker, of Chicago, the vice-presidents, and Robert L. McMillan, of Boston, the secretary-treasurer.

A National badminton championship tournament will be held next winter at a location yet to be chosen, and it is felt that it will also serve as a great convention which will bring the many sections of the A.B.A. into close harmony.

# THE AMERICAN BADMINTON ASSOCIATION

BADMINTON players throughout the United States are interested in the formation of the American Badminton Association, which was organized during the past summer months by the nine sectional Associations. These nine Associations which have banded themselves together are:

Badminton Assn. of New England, Inc.
Metropolitan New York Badminton Assn.
California State Badminton Assn.
Washington State Badminton Assn.
Philadelphia Badminton Assn.
Michigan Badminton Assn.
Midwest Badminton Assn.
Tri-State Badminton Assn.
Western N.Y. Badminton Assn.

The first question always asked about a new Association is— "Why is it needed, and what does it propose to do?" This is not a sudden development, but it is the result of months of correspondence between the various regional associations. and has been discussed in various badminton publications.

The local Associations felt that they needed some central headquarters to determine national policies and to iron out differences of interpretations on playing rules.

The National Association will not only regulate and standardize rules of play, but it will be the final authority on matters pertaining to amateur status.

It will plan to hold a national tournament each year, a feature which has been demanded with increasing insistence by players throughout the country. It will thus rank the better players throughout the country.

Secretaries of associations have been overwhelmed with requests from private groups and clubs throughout the country to give them information about the game, and now for the first time there is established a central office where such requests can be referred, and where authoritative information can be obtained.

The protection of the game from commercial exploitation is another aim of the Association, as commercialism can quickly ruin many of the interesting features of the game, as now played.

Badminton has been gaining popularity very rapidly in the United States during the past few years, and the publicity given to it by the various national magazines and by professional exhibitions has been of great help in arousing interest.

It is the hope of the officials of the American Association that the benefits of the game can be more widely known and that the game may truly become one of the major forms of recreation in the United States.

## BADMINTON IN THE UNITED STATES COMES OF AGE

THE GAME of badminton has grown so rapidly in the United States during the past few years that the various playing groups have deemed it necessary to form a national association.

At a meeting held in Boston in March, 1936, at the time of the New England Tournament, the nine associations which were rep-

resented either in person or by proxy named an organization committee. This committee has drawn up a constitution which has been formally ratified by these associations, and the American Badminton Association is now a reality.

The objects of the Association are:

- 1. To promote and develop the game of badminton in the United States without purpose of monetary gain.
  - 2. To assist in the development of clubs and associations.
- 3. To establish and uphold rules of play and to determine the status of players.
- 4. To arrange and manage national tournaments in the United States, to sanction regional, sectional and state championship tournaments and to act as the United States authority in any international tournaments.

The membership of the Association is comprised of three classes of members, viz.:

- 1. Associations (state, sectional, or regional).
- 2. Clubs (so situated that they cannote practically become affiliated with other clubs in an association).
- 3. Groups (players in schools, colleges, Y.M.C.A.'s, etc., which are not represented in any association).

The constitution divides the country into six regions as follows: New England, Middle Atlantic, Southern, Mid-Western, Western and Pacific. The Board of Directors will be representative of these different sections of the country, except, of course, in those portions where there are no associations there will not be any directors.

The President and the two Vice-Presidents will be representative of the Eastern, Central and Western sections of the United States.

Provision is made in the constitution for the following committees: Nominating, Rules, Amateur Status, Ranking, Membership, Tournament and Publicity.

The annual meeting of the American Badminton Association will be held in conjunction with the National Tournament which will probably be early in April. It is practically a certainty that the first annual tournament, open only to amateurs residing in the United States, will be held in the spring of 1937.

## METROPOLITAN BADMINTON ASSOCIATION

A PPROXIMATELY thirty clubs, in the vicinity of Greater New York, Long Island and Southwestern Connecticut, are to be found in the strong group known as the Metropolitan Badminton Association.

Curtis N. Browne served as its president. The Honorary Secretary is Esmond B. Gardner, and Edward S. Jarrett, Jr., is the Honorary Treasurer. Donald Vaughan is the National Committeeman.

Harry S. Gorgas, of the Garden City Casino, is the new president of the Metropolitan group. Associated with him are Leland R. Gustavson, of the Badminton Club of Westport, vice-president; Henry A. Bultman, of the Badminton Club of New York, Treas.; and Edwin S. Jarrett, Jr., of the Central Badminton Club, secretary.



It now embraces some 35 clubs, located in the New England States, and has three fine tournaments, international in character, back of it, as the standard of play has shown marked improvement.

L. R. Daniels, of Boston, is its president, with Philip Richardson, one of the best players in New England, acting as Honorary Secretary. Donald E. Wilbur, of Boston, represents this group as National Committeeman.

## NEW ENGLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

FOR international badminton of high character, embracing the United States and Canada, possibly no tournament has surpassed the fourth annual New England Championships, played in late March at the University Club, Boston.

No clearer way to substantiate this statement would be than to enumerate the survivors of this splendid tournament, which saw the Canadian champion, Mrs. W. R. Walton, Jr., of Toronto. annex the women's singles, 11-7, 11-4, after an international final with Mary Whittemore. of Boston.

Joe Zaharko, of Toronto, high rating Canadian, needs no introduction to the major badminton circles. He took the singles in a final which saw Howland Smith, also of Toronto, opposing him, winning 9-15, 15-1, 15-6. Some startling occurrences had seen Smith beat the strong Scottish internationalist, Ken Davidson, presently of New York, and Howard Webster, Montreal, turn back the greatest American threat, Walter Kramer, Detroit, in an earlier round.

## OHIO STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

A NEW figure in North American badminton circles stepped into prominence during the holding of the Third Annual Ohio State championships, which were played at the Moreland School, Shaker Heights, Cleveland, on February 15th and 16th.

Kenneth R. Davidson, famous Internationalist from overseas, emerged victorious in the men's singles, but only after encountering stubborn opposition as he fought his way to his first major triumph on this side of the Atlantic. The English star succeeded in taking the Ohio singles by beating Walter Kramer, of Detroit, rated by many as the best amateur in the United States, by the scores of 15-7, 15-13.

It was in the semi-finals that the overseas player ran into his most serious difficulties, for he was opposed by Walter Windeyer, of Toronto, more famous through his participation in international yachting events than badminton, the Canadian carrying the match three games, as he became worn during the process of going the extra game with Davidson. The scores were 5-15, 15-10, 15-0. This match was considered the best of the tournament. It appeared that a triumph for the veteran Windeyer was imminent, for after winning the opener, 15-5, he proceeded to pile up an 8-2 lead. Here the turn in the match came as Davidson applied his full pressure, Windeyer wilting badly under the strain, as Davidson ran up a total of 28 points to take the game and match, Windeyer being able to gain by two points during the time.

In the doubles she also repeated, teaming with Mrs. Walter Windeyer, Toronto, to beat Mrs. Barbara Duffy and Mrs. Betty Elmendorf, Cleveland, 15-5, 15-6.

Walter Windeyer and Alex Billedsen, Toronto, featured in a sparkling international feature when they won the men's doubles from Kenneth Davidson, New York, and C. L. Nichols, Cleveland. The latter is secretary-tresurer of the Cleveland Badminton Association.

The threat of Canadians was checked in the mixed doubles final, when an Anglo-American combination, Kenneth Davidson and Mrs. C. L. Nichols, Cleveland, defeated Walter Kramer, Detroit, and Myrtle Tebbutt, Cleveland, in the final by 15-4, 15-10 scores.

The annual United States Inter-City Doubles matches were held in conjunction with the tournament, and saw Walter and Louis Kramer, Detroit, win the final from H. Seymour Colton and Bert Winston, Cleveland, 15-8, 15-10.

## WASHINGTON STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS



Mrs. Jones, incidentally, proved the only member of the home club to gain a title, quite a difference from other years, when Pasadena players pretty well spread-eagled the field.

Chester Goss, of Los Angeles, showed the effects of the teachings of Jess Willard, the noted badminton pro, as he set about sweeping the men's events. Aided by a tremendous reach, which gave him wonderful court coverage, Goss had too much for the opposition, beating Don Eversole, also of Los Angeles, in the ultimate round, 15-8, 15-7. A capacity house witnessed the final night's play.

## ALL-ENGLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

THE thirty-third tournament for the All-England Badminton Championships was held at Horticultural Hall, Westminster, during the first week in March, the entries in the men's singles being down slightly in numbers, but women's singles showing a perceptible increase.

R. F. C. Nicholds won the men's singles for the third occasion, being drawn in the final against R. M. White, who he beat after an extra game, 18-16, 17-18, 15-10.

Thelma Kingsbury fulfilled predictions when she battled to her first singles triumph, showing exceedingly good form to deprive Mrs. H. S. Uber of her title, by 5-11, 11-3, 11-2 scores in the final.

A four-year domination of men's doubles was shattered for D. C. Hume and R. M. White, when the Nichols brothers won the final, 15-7, 15-2. The principals had been drawn together in the ultimate round of the All-England for the previous three years, with Hume-White invariably coming out on top.

For the third straight year Mrs. Henderson and Thelma Kingsbury functioned together as a triumphant doubles team, beating Mrs. Uber and Miss Doveton, 15-10, 5-15, 15-7. It was the fourth straight for Miss Kingsbury, who also was successful in 1933 with another partner, M. Bell.

Mrs. Uber, unsuccessful in two other finals, was rewarded with the mixed doubles title, teaming with D. C. Hume to beat Maconachie and Thelma Kingsbury in the final, 18-15, 15-8.

# RULES OF BADMINTON AS PLAYED IN NORTH AMERICA

#### THE COURTS

1.—A Court is laid out as in the diagram shown on next page, and defined by white or black lines 1½ inches wide.

2.—The Net shall be made of fine tanned cord of ¾-in. square mesh, and may be 17-ft. to 24-ft. in length, according to the position of the posts (vide Notes, diagram next page), and 2-ft. 6-in. in depth. The top of the net shall be 5-ft. in height at the centre, and 5-ft. 1-in. at the posts, and shall be edged with a 3-in. white tape doubled and supported by a cord run through the tape, and strained over and flush with the top of the posts.

3.—The posts shall be 5-ft. 1-in. in height, and shall be sufficiently firm to keep the net strained as above. If possible, the posts shall be placed on the side boundary lines of the court—if not possible, a thin post or strip of material not less than two inches in width shall be fixed to the side boundary line and rise vertically to the cord.


4.—The Shuttles shall weigh from 73 to 85 grains, and shall have from 14 to 16 feathers fixed in a cork 1-in. to 1½-in. in diameter. The feathers shall be from 2½-in. to 2¾-in. in length, shall have from 2½-in. to 2½-in. spread at the top, and shall be firmly fastened and cemented at a height of about 1-in. above the cork, with thread.

A Shuttlecock shall be deemed to be of correct pace if, when a player of average strength strikes it with a full underhand stroke with a reasonably tightly strung racket from a spot immediately above one back boundary line in a line parallel to the side lines, and at an upward angle of approximately 45 degrees, it falls not less than one foot and not more than 2-ft. 6-in. short of the back boundary line.

# THE FOUR-HANDED OR DOUBLE GAME

5.—The game is played by two players a side.

6.—The side winning the toss shall have choice of serving first or ends.



NOTE: Dimensions are to outside of all lines, said lines to be 11/2 inches wide.

The side winning a game shall always serve first in the next game, but in doubles either of the winners may continue serving and either of the losers may receive the service.

\*7.—The four-handed game consists of 15 or 21 aces, as may be arranged. Provided that in a game of 15 aces, when the score is 13 all, the side which first reaches 13 has the option of "setting" the game to 5, and that when the score is 14 all, the side which first reaches 14 has the option of "setting" the game to 3. After a game has been "set" the score is called "love all," and the side which first scores 5 or 3 aces, according as the game has been "set" at 13 or 14 all, wins the game. In either case the claim to "set" the game must be made before the next service is delivered after the score has reached 13 all or 14 all. Provided also that in a game of 21 aces the same method of scoring be adopted, substituting 19 and 20 for 13 and 14.

Note—"Setting" is not permitted in handicap games.

8.—A rubber is the best of three games. The players shall change ends at the commencement of the second game, and also of the third game, if a third game is necessary to decide the rubber. In the third game the players shall also change ends, when the leading score reaches 8, in a game of 15 aces, at 6, in a game of 11 aces, or 11, in a game of 21 aces, or in handicap games, when either side has scored half the total number of aces required to win the game (the next highest number being taken in case of fractions). In matches decided by a single game the players shall change ends as provided above for the third game of a rubber.

# THE PLAY

9.—It having been decided which side is to have the first service, the player in the right-hand half court of that side commences the game by serving to the player in the opposite right-hand half court. If the latter player returns the shuttle before it touches the ground it is to be returned by one of the "in" side and then returned by one of the "out" side, and so on, till a fault is made or the shuttle ceases to be "in play." If a fault is made by the "in" side, the server's hand is out, and as the side beginning a game has only one hand in its first innings (vide Law 13) the player in the right-hand opposite half court now becomes the server; but if the service is not returned, or the fault is made by the "out" side, the "in" side scores an ace. The "in" side players then change from one half court to the other, the server now being in the left-hand half court and serving to the player in the opposite left-hand court. So long as a side remains "in" service is delivered alternately from each half court into the one diagonally opposite, the change being made by the "in" side when, and only when, an ace is added to its score.

\*Official contests for men are 15 points only.

The first service of a side in each innings shall be made from the right-hand half court. After the service is delivered, the server and the player served to may take up any positions they choose on their side of the net, irrespective of any boundary lines.

#### THE TWO-HANDED OR SINGLE GAME

- 10.—In games of one player on each side, the above rules hold good, except that—
  - (a) The players shall serve from and receive service in the right-hand half courts only when the server's score is O, or when he has scored an even number of aces in the game, the service being delivered from and received in the left-hand half courts when the server has scored an odd number of aces.
  - (b) Both players shall change half courts after each ace has been scored, and consecutive services shall be received by the same player.
  - (c) In ladies' singles matches the game shall consist of 11 aces. Provided that when the score is 9 all, the side which first reaches 9 has the option of "setting" the game to 5, and when the score is 10 all, the side which first reaches 10 may "set" the game to 3.
- N.B.—The courts for the single game are laid out as provided in diagram and the notes thereto appended.

#### GENERAL RULES

- 11.—The player served to may alone take the service, and no player may take two consecutive services in the same game.
- 12.—The server may not serve till his opponent is ready, but if a return of the service be attempted the latter shall be deemed to be ready.
- 13.—The side beginning a game has only one hand in its first innings. In all subsequent innings each partner on each side has a hand, the partners serving consecutively.
- 14.—The server and the player served to must stand within the limits of their respective half courts (as bounded by the short and long service, the central, and side lines), and some part of both feet of these players must remain in contact with the ground until the service is delivered.—Vide Notes to Law 10 (c), supra.
- 15.—It is a "Let" if the shuttle touches the net in service, provided the service be otherwise good, but if in play it does not invalidate the stroke. It is a good return if the shuttle, having passed outside either post drop on or within any of the boundary lines of

the opposite court. A "Let" may also be given by the umpire for any unforeseen or accidental hindrance.

16.—If a player serves out of his turn, or from the wrong half court (owing to a m:stake as to the half court from which service is at the time being in order), and wins the ace, it shall be a "Let" provided such "Let" be claimed or allowed before the next succeeding service is delivered.

17.—If a player standing in his wrong half court takes the service, and his side wins the rally, it shall be a "Let" provided that such "Let" be claimed or allowed before the next succeeding service is delivered.

Note.—Should a player inadvertently change sides when he ought not to, and the mistake not be discovered until after the next service has been delivered, the mistake shall stand, and a "Let' cannot be claimed or allowed.

18.—It shall be the duty of the umpire to call "Fault" or "Let," should either occur, without appeal being made by the players, and to give his decision on any appeal regarding a point in dispute, if made before the next service; and also to appoint linesmen if necessary. In matches, where umpires are appointed, their decision shall be final, but where a referee is appointed an appeal shall lie to him from the decision of an umpire on questions of law only.

19.—If the server, in attempting to serve, misses the shuttle altogether, it does not count as a fault; but if the shuttle be touched, no matter how slightly, by the racket, a service is thereby delivered, and the rules governing the service at once apply.

20.—If A is serving to B and the shuttle strikes or is struck by B's partner, even if he is standing outside the court, A scores an ace.

21.—A player who strikes the shuttle in play (unless he thereby makes a good return), or is struck by it, loses the stroke, no matter whether he is standing within the boundaries of the court or outside them.

22.—If in service the shuttle strikes the top of the net, and is then struck by the player served to, it is tssumed that the shutle would have fallen into the proper court. It is thus a "Let" under Law 15. and a fault cannot be claimed.

23.—If in service, or during a rally, a shuttle, after passing over the net, is caught in or on the net, it shall be a "Let."

24.—If during a rally, the shuttle falls into the net or outside the court, and the receiver then touches the net with his racket or person, there is no penalty on his part as the shuttle is not then in play.

25.—The word "player" applies to all those taking part in a game from the moment the shuttle is struck by the server.

26.—If a player has a chance of smashing when quite near the net, his opponent must not put up his racket near the net on the chance of the shuttlecock rebounding from it. This action shall be taken to be obstruction, within the meaning of Law 28 (h). A player may, however, hold up his racket to protect his face from being hit if he does not thereby baulk his opponent.

#### FAULTS

27.—A fault made by either player of the side which is "in," puts the server out; if made by a player whose side is "out," it counts an ace to the "in" side.

28.-It is a fault-

- (a) If the service is overhand. (A service shall be deemed to be overhand, within the meaning of this rule, if the shuttle at the instant of being struck be higher than the server's waist.)
- (b) If in serving, the shuttle falls into the wrong half court (i.e., into the one not diagonally opposite to the server), or falls short of the short-service line, or beyond the long-service line, or outside the side boundary lines of the half court into which service is in order.
- (c) If the server's feet are not in the half court from which service is at the time being in order, or if the feet of the player taking the service are not in the half court into which service is at the time being in order (vide Law 14) until the service is delivered.
  - Note (1).—A "service" is delivered as soon as the shuttle is struck by the server's racket.
  - Note (2).—A foot on the line is out of court.
  - Note (3).—Law 28 (c) applies only to the server and to the player taking the service. The respective partners may take up any position, provided they do not unsight or otherwise obstruct their opponents.
- (d) If, during the service the server or his partner makes, in the opinion of the umpire, preliminary feints, or otherwise intentionally balks his opponent.
- (e) If, either in service or play, the shuttle falls outside the boundaries, or passes through or under the net, or fails to pass the net, or touches the roof or side walls, or the person or dress of any player.

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Note.—A shuttle falling on any line is held to have fallen in the court or half court of which such line is a boundary.

- (f) If the shuttle "in play" be struck before it crosses to the striker's side of the net. The striker may, however, follow the shuttle over the net with his racket. Note.—A shuttle is "in play" from the time it is hit by the racket of the server until it touches the ground, or the person or dress of any player, or until a fault or "let" occurs.
- (g) If, while the shuttle is "in play," a player touch the net or its supports with racket, person, or dress.
- (h) If a player obstructs his opponent.
- (i) If Rule 14 be transgressed.
- (j) If the shuttle be hit twice in succession by the same player, or be hit by a player and partner, or if the shuttle be "slung"; but it is not a fault if the shuttlecock be struck cleanly by any part of the wood of the racquet.

# REGULATIONS FOR TOURNAMENTS

The following regulations shall apply to the holding of Open Tournaments sanctioned by the Canadian Badminton Association.

- 1.—Affiliated clubs proposing to hold open badminton tournaments shall, in all cases, before issuing any prospectus of the same, and before advertising, or otherwise announcing the particulars or proposed dates, make a formal application for the sanction of the Association.
- 2.—In the event of the proposed date or dates clashing with any fixture already duly sanctioned, or of any of the proposed conditions being held to be undesirable in the interests of the game, or opposed to the general convenience of players, and in the event of the club or clubs concerned declining to accept an alteration of date, or to modify any proposed condition in accordance with the decision of the committee of the Association, the said committee reserves the power to withhold sanction, and as a consequence, to debar any member of an affiliated club from taking part in such tournament, under penalty of exclusion from all other tournaments held under the sanction of the Association.
- 3.—Challenge Cups. Where a challenge cup is not played for in any one season, the holder shall be deemed to have won it again for that season.
- 4.—No competitor shall be permitted to play in any open tournament held by an affiliated club under sanction, as above provided, unless he or she is at the time being a member of an affiliated club.
- 5.—No Dummy entry in a single or Dummy pair in a doubles may be included in the draw of any level or championship event.
- 6.—No person who shall be a professional player of badminton shall be permitted to take part in a tournament held under these regulations. The committee of the Badminton Association will decide the status of any person upon facts submitted to them.
- 7.—Players participating in a singles match may rest for five minutes between the second and third games.

#### ADVICE TO BEGINNERS


Beginners who really wish to improve should join a club in which there are some good players, so that they may watch their methods and try to profit by them. Try to attend championship meets when the stars of the game are competing, in order to obtain as early as possible some appreciation of the standard of first-class play, on which they should try to model their efforts.

The buying of a good racket should be the beginner's first aim in taking up badminton.

The racket should be tightly strung, should always be kept in a press when not in use, never exposed to damp or the heat of a fire, and when it has a pronounced tendency to warp (as tightly strung rackets often have) it should be replaced in its press in between each match.

# HINTS TO TOURNAMENT COMMITTEES

- 1.—All courts at tournaments should be marked out for both singles and doubles play, except where space does not permit of this being done in the case of a court used for singles only.
- 2.—The draw shall be conducted as follows:—Each competitor's name, or the names of each pair of competitors in a doubles event, shall be allotted a number. As many numbers as there are playing units shall be written or printed on separate pieces of card or paper, and placed in a bowl or hat, drawn out one by one at random, and copied on a list in the order in which they have been drawn.
- 3.—When the number of playing units is 4, 8, 16, 32, 64, or any higher power of 2, they shall meet in pairs in the order drawn, as in the following diagram:




4.—When the number of playing units is not a power of 2, there shall be byes in the first round. The number of byes shall be equal to the difference between the next highest power of 2 and the number of playing units. The byes, if even in number, shall be

divided, as the names are drawn in equal proportions at the top and bottom of the list, above and below the pairs; if uneven in number, there shall be one more bye at the bottom than at the top.

EXAMPLE.—With 19 playing units there will be 32—19=13 byes, 6 at the top and 7 at the bottom of the list, and 3 matches in the first round, 8 in the second, 4 in the third, etc.

EXAMPLE.—With 9 playing units there will be 16—9=7 byes, 3 at the top and 4 at the bottom, and one match in the first round, thus:



With 5 playing units there will be 1 bye at the top and 2 byes at the bottom, thus:

With 6, 1 bye at the top, and 1 bye at the bottom.

With 7, 1 bye at the bottom.

With 8, no byes.

With 9, 3 byes at the top, and 4 byes at the bottom.

With 10, 3 byes at the top, and 3 byes at the bottom. With 11, 2 byes at the top, and 3 byes at the bottom.

With 12, 2 byes at the top, and 2 byes at the bottom.

With 13, 1 bye at the top, and 2 byes at the bottom.

With 14, 1 bye at the top, and 1 bye at the bottom.

With 15, 1 bye at the bottom.

With 16, no byes.

And so on with larger numbers in like manner.

# HINTS TO UMPIRES

BEFORE PLAY COMMENCES:

See that the net is the correct height.

If there are linesmen, see that they understand their duties and are placed where you can see them.

If the rules of the tournament give you control over the shuttles, have three or four tested shuttles ready, and do not sanction a change without good reason.

SERVICE:

Watch that the shuttle when struck, is not above the server's waist. Note.—It is almost impossible to judge this from a chair, and it is, therefore, well to delegate this duty to a linesman—on either side, if possible.

Watch for a "let."

Watch the fall of the shuttle if it be not taken.

Watch that the striker does not leave his court before the service is delivered.

PLAY:

Keep your eye on the shuttle.

Remember that a player who strikes a shuttle before it passes the net or who, before the shuttle is dead, touches the net or its supports with racket, person or clothes, loses the point.

Great care is necessary to avoid mistakes as to the number of hands in.

When a score at which setting is permissible is reached, ask the player who first reaches that score, whether he wishes to set.

See that the players change sides at the proper score in the third game.

FOUL STROKES:

The attention of umpires is particularly directed to Knotty Points

It is often a matter of considerable difficulty to decide whether a fault has been committed under Law 10 (h). In every case n which the umpire feels any doubt in this respect, he should give the benefit to the striker; only penalising a stroke when he is certain that Law 10 (h) (as interpreted in Knotty Point (i) has been contravened.

In deciding whether a stroke is or is not foul, an umpire will often obtain the clearest indication from:—

The flight of the shuttlecock. If the shuttlecock, on contact with the racket, starts to travel (for however short a distance) in a certain direction, and is then deflected by the racket from that direction, a foul must have been committed, either by carrying the shuttlecock, or striking it twice.

N.B.—Where a game is played without an umpire, it must of course be left to the good sense of the players to carry out the intention of Law 10 (h); but if players will keep in mind Knotty Point (i) and the Hints to Umpires quoted above, the proper interpretation of the Law should not be difficult.

#### GENERAL:

Remember that it is your opinion that is to lead you to a decision, not that of the players, still less that of the spectators.

If you cannot give a decision, do not be afraid to say so; in such a case, accept the opinion of the players if they are agreed, otherwise you must give a let.

Give your decisions as promptly as possible, but remember that over-anxiety to be smart may lead you into error.

Call the score clearly at the end of each rally, and loudly enough to be heard by spectators as well as players.

Where a linesman is appointed, his decision on all points relative to the line is absolutely final.

On the conclusion of a match take the score to the referee at once.

# DONT'S IN BADMINTON

DON'T alter your grip for any stroke.

DON'T "toss short."

DON'T try to "kill" everything.

DON'T omit to "feint"-but not too often.

DON'T do a half-hearted smash.

DON'T forget the longer the flight, the slower the bird—therefore, wait.

DON'T try impossible strokes.

DON'T underrate your opponent.

DON'T give up trying. DON'T forget to encourage your partner.

DON'T get in your partner's way.

DON'T forget that to lose your temper generally loses the game.

DON'T ever stand still, but be always on the move.

# CANADIAN SQUASH CHAMPIONSHIPS

A N INVADER from close to the international boundary line carried off the major spoils in Canadian squash racquets, when Cyrus Polley, of Buffalo, N.Y., a member of the American international team, defeated Hubert Martin in the final, 15-6, 15-11, 8-15, 15-7 at the Badminton and Racquet Club in Toronto, on February 16th.

In the previous round Polley put out his club-mate, Rogers, while Martin was eliminating Jack McCausland of Toronto, in four games.

Martin's hardest battle, outside the final, came in the quarters, when "Blondy" Vickers of Toronto carried the issue the full five games, the scores going 13-18, 11-15, 15-6, 18-15, 15-10 in an exterminating match.

The final match was played before the largest gallery that has witnessed a title tilt in years. Martin opened the scoring, but was quickly forced on the defensive as Polley's perfectly placed corner shots registered with uncanny accuracy. In the third game, the youthful Hamilton defender forced the play and went into the lead for the first time with a 3-2 score. When several of Polley's shots hit the tell-tale, Martin appeared to have solved the Buffalo racquet-wielder's style, when he carried the score to 14-8. Polley seemed tired and saved himself for the fourth game when he let the next point go for a score, 15-8.

Polley opened the deciding game with a dazzling burst of speed that fairly swept Martin off his feet. Maintaining the terrific pace, Polley ran eight points to carry the game with a score of 15-7.

# CANADIAN RACQUETS CHAMPIONSHIPS

THE string of successes of the famous New Yorker, C. C. Shelton of New York reversed the order of last year's final when he defeated Pell in the ultimate round, 15-3, 7-15, 15-12, 15-10. Sir John lost out to the winner in straight games, 15-8, 15-7, 15-9. In the other bracket Pell advanced at the expense of W. Palmer Dixon of New York, another prominent internationalist in rackets. Jean Rolland of the Montreal Rackets club was the last of the Canadian-born in the singles, being beaten by Dixon, 15-8, 15-6, 15-2 in the quarters.

In the doubles, Canadian entrants met with greater success, Sir George Child and G. D. Huband eventually taking the title as they engaged in a terrific final with W. P. Dixon and Ogden Phipps of New York, which went to 11-15, 15-5, 17-16, 15-7, 15-3 scores. The latter is court tennis champion of the United States, and has played comparatively little rackets. Incidentally, one of the finest matches of the tournament in the singles revolved around Phipps and Sir John Child, the latter winning by 4-15, 17-16, 16-8, 15-14, 17-16.

Pell, in addition to having won the Canadian championship eight times, has taken the U. S. rackets title 15 times, and the English championship once, being the only Amercian to ever accomplish the latter feat.

# LAWS OF SQUASH RACKETS

(Revised to January, 1933, by The Canadian Squash Rackets Assn.)

#### SINGLES

#### COURT

1. Court dimensions, lights, tell-tale, material and construction, painting and lines shall be such as are from time to time approved by the executive committee of Canadian Squash Rackets Association and on file in the office of the Secretary of such Association.

#### BALL

2. The standard singles ball shall be used in all tournaments sanctioned by the Association and shall be subject to change by the executive committee of the Association, the official ball from time to time in use by the United States Squash Rackets Association. No ball may be heated or chilled before or during a match. At any time when not in actual play a new ball may be substituted by mutual consent of the players or by decision of the referee.

#### RACKETS

3. The Racket shall have a wooden frame in the shape of a rackets bat, provided that its entire length shall not exceed 27 inches. It shall be strung with gut or some substitute, but not with metal.

#### SCORE

4. Every point won by either player shall add one to his score.

#### GAME

- 5. The Game shall be fifteen up, that is, the player who first scores fifteen points wins the game, provided that:
  - (a) At 13 all, the receiver must elect one of the following before the next serve—
    - (1) Set to 5 points-making the game 18 points.
    - (2) Set to 3 points—making the game 16 points.
    - (3) No set, in which event the game remains 15 points.
  - (b) At 14 all, provided the score has not been 13 all, the receiver must elect one of the following before the next serve—
    - (1) Set to 3-making the game 17 points.
  - (2) No set, in which event the game remains 15 points. Note:—There shall be no setting in handicap matches.

#### MATCH

- 6. The maximum number of games in a match shall be five. The first player to win three games shall win the match. Play shall be continuous from the first service until the match is concluded, except that when caused by circumstances not within the control of the players, the referee may suspend play for such period as he may consider necessary. Play shall never be suspended to allow a player to recover his strength or wind. In the event of play being suspended for the day, the match shall start afresh.
- 7. At the start of a match the choice of serving or receiving shall be decided by the spin of a racket; thereafter whenever the server loses a point he shall also lose the serve.

#### SERVICE

- 8. At the beginning of each game, and each time there is a new server, the ball shall be served from whichever service box the server elects, and thereafter alternately until the service is lost or until the end of the game. If a let is allowed, the server shall serve again from the same box. If the server serves from the wrong box there shall be no penalty and the service shall count as if served from the correct box, except that if the receiver does not attempt to return the service, he may demand that it be served from the correct box. The server must stand with at least one foot entirely within, and not touching, the line surrounding the service box and serve the ball on to the front wall above the service line so that on its rebound (return) it first strikes the floor within, but not touching, the lines of the opposite service court, either before or after touching any other wall or walls, otherwise it is a Fault. If it be the first Fault, the server shall serve again from the same side. If the server makes two consecutive Faults, he loses that point. The server shall also lose the point:
  - (a) If the ball touches a side or back wall before the front wall.

(b) If the ball touches the tell-tale or below it.

(c) If the ball touches anything outside the playing surfaces of the court, including lights, netting, galleries and ceiling [subject to paragraph 10 (f)].

If the server misses the ball altogether it shall not count as a fault. If the server serves before the receiver is ready, the service shall not count unless the receiver returns or attempts to return the service, and the server shall be entitled to two new services. When one service fault has been called, and play for any reason has stopped on the second service, the first fault does not stand, and the server is entitled to two new services.

# RETURN OF SERVICE AND SUBSEQUENT PLAY 9.

- (a) To make a good return the ball must be struck (and not pushed or scooped) on the volley or before it has touched the floor twice, and reach the front wall on the fly above the tell-tale, and it may touch any wall or walls within the court before or after reaching the front wall, but it may not touch or go outside the boundary lines of the court, the ceiling, lights, galleries or anything not a part of the court itself [subject to paragraph 10 (f)].
- (b) A service called a Fault may not be played, but the receiver may volley any service which has struck the front wall in accordance with Rule No. 8.
- (c) Until the ball has been touched or has hit the floor twice it may be struck at any number of times.

#### LET

- 10. A Let is the stopping of play and the replaying of the point. A Let shall be called:
  - (a) If the striker is inadvertently hindered by his opponent from reaching or striking the ball.
  - (b) If, owing to the position of his opponent, a player is unable to avoid being touched by the ball.
  - (c) If the player refrains from striking at the ball owing to a reasonable fear of injuring his opponent.
  - (d) If the ball in play touches any artice lying in the court.
  - (e) If a ball breaks during play.
  - (f) If an otherwise good return or service has been made but the ball goes out of court on its first bounce.

Provided always that, in respect of paragraphs (a), (b), (c) and (d) herein, no Let shall be allowed unless the striker could have made a good return if not hindered or unless in the act of striking and before hitting the ball he touches or is touched by his opponent or his racket.

# KEEPING OUT OF OPPONENT'S WAY

- 11. Each player must get out of his opponent's way immediately after he has struck the ball and do all he can to:
  - (a) Give his opponent a fair view of the ball, provided that interference purely with the opponent's vision in following the flight of the ball is not a Let.
  - (b) Avoid interfering with his opponent in gettnig to and/or striking at the ball.

(c) Leave his opponent as much as possible free to play the ball to any part of the front wall or to either side wall near the front wall.

#### BAULK

12. If a player deliberately or intentionally or unnecessarily interferes with his opponent, it shall constitute a Baulk. When a Baulk is called, play shall stop and a point shall go to the player interefered with and the game shall continue as if that player had won a point. Unnecessary crowding shall constitute a Baulk, even though the opposing player is not actually prevented from reaching the ball or striking at it.

# FAIR BALL TOUCHING PLAYER

13. If a fair ball, after hitting the front wall and before being played again, touches either player, or anything he wears or carries (except his racket in the act of returning the ball) before touching the floor twice, the player so touched loses the point, subject to paragraph 10 (b) above.

# FAIRLY STRUCK BALL HITTING PLAYER

14. If the ball, after being struck from a good service or return, and before reaching the front wall, hits the striker's opponent or his racket, or anything he wears or carries, it shall be a Let if the return would have hit the front wall fairly, either directly or indirectly, but if the return would not have been fair, the striker shall lose the point. Play shall cease even though the ball goes up.

#### REFEREE

15.

(a) The Referee's decision on all questions shall be final.

(b) It is the duty of the Referee to call a let or baulk and immediately stop the play. If the Referee fails to call a let or baulk when, in the opinion of a player, he has been interfered with, the player may appeal to the Referee.


(c) The Referee shall be the sole judge of intentional delay and shall keep and call the score and interpret and enforce these laws, and may appoint one or two umpires to assist him if he sees fit so to do.

(d) The Referee may award the match to one player for default by his opponent, or if his opponent fails to be present in the court and ready to play within fifteen minutes of the advertised time to play, or for intentional delay by a player, or for incapacity of one player to complete the match and, with the approval of two umpires, for any other reason whatsoever.





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
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
